OUR WINNING LETTER.

The Public School Board of Woodville has had a special meeting Tuesday night to consider a proposition from the Catholic clergy to transfer the Catholic school to the Public School Board of Guelph. Mr. Murray and Mr. P. J. O'Connell presented the case of the Catholic school. They asked that the Public School Board take over the Catholic school as a municipal school and equip it with the same. A LETTER FROM THE "RAMBER" LEAVING OTTAWA ON TUESDAY, 27th.

My face was turned westward, and passing Beloeil, Stettin, Ashton and the Junction, I was in the train when pulled me along as fast as I could. I saw a passenger through the window, a man in a suit, who is both an old and a young man, both sides of the Mississippi, who lives in the "Father of Waters" which flows from north to south in the neighboring Republic, but that beautiful stream has become a passageway through the County of Lanark, and discharging its waters into the Ottawa at Fitzroy Harbour, in the County of Carleton. Almonte is the centre of important manufacturing industries. Here you will be found woollen mills, cotton mills, boot and shoe factories, mill races, and mills which grind slowly yet surely. Although containing a population not largely exceeding 2,000, it is a prosperous place, much of which is due to the enterprise of the Rosmond brothers, but unfortunately, first saw the light in the County of LeTrin, Province of Connaught, Ireland.

Messrs. Bennett and James Rosmond are extensive employers of skilled labor, and it is only justice to give them credit for their enterprise. They are the noblest and largest employers of labor throughout the Dominion, but in the management of their business, Orangemen, and the sons of an Orangeman, as they are, it has become a cardinal maxim with the Messrs. Rosmond, Bennett, to have in their employ North Lanark in the Dominion Parliament, and although through unbroken silence he is not fortunate enough to empty the whole Chamber of all except the Speaker, the Pages, the Sergeant-at-Arms, and the stenographer, he has not been forgotten. From the "Pile of Bones"—Mr. Nicholas Flood (Jr.)—yet on committees where thought is crystallized into legislation, his worth and usefulness are fully appreciated. The prosperity which now reigns supreme in Almonte, and the feeling of ancient grief and disappointment to many who shook their heads, and lengthened their faces, whilst predicting the utter collapse and total annihilation of things in general, and manufacturing industries in particular, in the want of a change in Government in 1896. The change came, and most astonishing of all, the factories which ran only two-thirds of the time prior to that date, are now open almost day and night, and are still unable to fill the orders for their wares.

Almonte contains many associations of a benevolent, charitable and social character, prominent amidst which stands the "Father Matthew Temperance Association," an organization which has been instrumental in giving a feeling of many self-respect and independence to many of the young men of the town. This grand effort to emancipate the rising generation from the demoralizing influences of the whiskey-shop, was inaugurated in 1873, and incorporated in 1875. In 1875, the incorporation of the name of those who sought incorporation of the association which had the sanction and blessing of God and His Church, I find many have passed into eternity, there to receive the reward of their labors, whilst others are still in the flesh, waiting the opportunity of a banner, and setting an example, the salutary effects of which may pass down amidst unborn generations.
