Faircattle Summary.

— 1,200,000 feet of deals reached Quebec on the 17th.

— 3,500 tons of coal were shipped from Picton last week.

— In the saw mill of Smith, Dobbie & Co., Angus, Ontario, one saw cut 79,200 feet in a single day last week.

— The introduction of the new hotel cars on the Great Western Railway has had the effect of closing up the dining-rooms at London station.

— London (Ont.) has supplied a quantity of Freight cars to the North Shore Railway; they are now arrived at South Quebec.

— The Commercial Agency of John McKillop & Co. has opened an office at Evansville, Ind.

— The Canadian Rubber Company of Montreal have shipped 1,000 feet of their improved carbolized hose to Victoria, British Columbia.

— A Montreal firm which exhibits tacks and nails at the Centennial has received the first of a series of orders for its goods to be shipped to Turkey.

— Grain storage rates at Montreal are as follows:— $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per bush. for the first 5 days. $\frac{1}{4}$ cent per bush. for the second 5 days. $\frac{1}{4}$ cent per bush. for the third 5 days. $\frac{1}{4}$ cent per bush. for each additional 10 days.

— The total assessment of the city of Ottawa for 1876 is \$11,713,470, being an increase of \$128,000 as compared with last year. Population 25,214. The assessment has doubled since 1872.

— Mr. Carsley's dry-goods store in Montreal was on fire yesterday; the promptitude of the brigade and salvage corps did good service. The principal damage is from water and smoke. Fully insured.

— As the May statement of the chartered banks received through the Canada Gazette is somewhat incomplete we defer it to next week. The total liabilities of the banks are shown to be \$90,776,069.96; total assets, \$172,418,531.64.

— On the 31st the St. Lawrence Bank will change its name to the Standard Bank. The capital is being reduced 25 per cent., and the
