MONTSERRAT.

A Very Ancient Shrine.

The Old Story of a Famous Site in Beligious History Retold,

Thirty mlles from Bercelona an isolated mass of serrated rocks arises from the plain, forming an imposing sight; it is Monserra', the old Monserratus, "jagged as a saw," 3,800 feet high, the base being about twenty-four miles in circumference. One old legend relates that the strange form of its rugged and conical peaks is due to an earth quake which took place at the time of the crucifixion; other writers attribute it to some velosnic eruttion. From all parts of the mountain beautiful landscapes oan be seen. There are the mountains of Aragon, Vilencia and the snow-capped Pyreness, while away on the east is the blue Mediterranean with the Balearic Isles. Cause Difficulty at Washington.

Mr. Blaine's Depiomacy Produces Unextricable Confusion in the State Depart ment.

NEW YORK, July 31 .- The Herald's Wash ington special says that that paper's despatch ing the protection of American interests in Bebring sea. The State department, it appears, has nothing to do with matters in Buring sea. The Tressury department knows nothing about are British sealers being in that sea, but thinks if they are the State department may probably know something about it. The dismantling orders, of May 21, it is now slieged, were actually made with Mr. Blaine's knowledge and appreval and upen his view of the law of the case. 
