general?

IIINISTER LALOHDE: There is comparatively little we can do, This issue is going to be unresolved; and we have urged the Quebec Government to call its referendum as soon as possible -- the sooner the better.

You know, there is nothing that capital fears more than uncertainty, and this has been very bad for Quebec; and not good for Canada. As long as this climate of uncortainty is going to be arounc, it is going co nurt the Rucbec econony indirectly.

If Zuebec vere to welay, indefinitely, its referendum, because they are afraid that they may not win it-we might follow along that line.

I intend to introduce -- the Government intends to introduce a Federal Referendum law during the course of the present session; and we are likely to have, in our Statute, the authority, before the end of the year, to call a referendum of our own. So, if there is evidence that the ?uebec government is dragging its feet, indefinitely maintaining uncertainty, and that we see a very serious negative economic impact arising out of that situation, we might --

HEHBER OF THE PRESS: On a nation-wide referendum-or quebec only?

HINISTER LALONDE: It could be nation-wide. It
