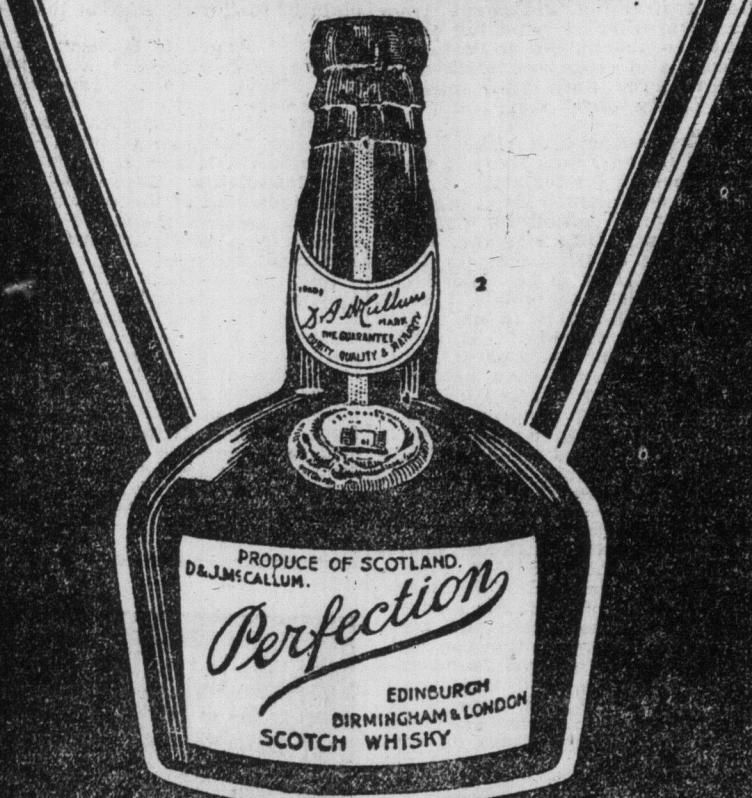

## ONTARIO JOCKEY CLUB STAKES

King's Plate Has 42 Entries, Including Hearts of Oak, Ondramida, Battle Song, and Others.

The probability of Harry Giddings' superb colt, Hearts of Oak, starting in the King's Plate this year did not deter owners of the other eligibles in entering for the great turf classic of the province, for when entries closed March 1 for this event, no less than forty-two nominations had been mailed to secretary Fraser of the O. J. C. and the list of nominations is the most representative that we have ever had, including as it does, the names of twenty-nine different owners.

Naturally the big stables such as Seagram's, Hendrie's, Giddings' and Brookdale and Davies', have a number of strings to their bows. The O. J. C. President's nominees are four, all three-year-olds, including Battle Song, a bay filly by Havoc-Rose Madrigal, and Maid of Frome, a bay filly by Havoc-Frome, that won last year as two-year-olds.

Harry Giddings has also entered four, including Hearts of Oak, the Canadian champion two-year-old of 1912 and Ondramida, the latter a half-sister to Ondramon. The Giddings' entries are all by Baswell and one of the four, Venus Urania, is a three-year-old own sister to the 1911 King's Plate winner, St. Bass.

Of the Brookdale stable's four, two are by the King Edward Hotel Club and Toronto Cup winner, Tongador, one by Fort Hunter, Canadian Derby and Toronto Cup winner, and one by Sain, sire of Hecsey, last year's Plate winner.

Two of the three nominations of Robert Davies, are by Orme Shore and the other by Alister d'Or. Among Col. John S. Handrie's entries is that of Rockspring, a four-year-old gelding by Martimus, (Future winner) out of Springwells.

Mrs. Livingston, whose colors are popular on the big tracks, has no entries for the Plate as the O. J. C. has ruled that horses owned by her were not eligible as she is not a bona-fide resident of Ontario, but several that were foaled on her Pontiac farm at Cobourg, are nominated by other parties who bought them as yearlings or as two-year-olds.

The filly Auster, by Stanhope II—Athleen, owned by J. S. Flynn, of Prescott, is entered and this one is a product of the Pontiac Farm, and Auster carries the distinction of being the only Province-bred to take the measure of Hearts of Oak last year.

The Maple Leaf Stakes to be run in 1914 and the Breeders' Stakes also to be run next year, closed March 1, the former with 47 entries and the latter with 19.

No less than 81 nominations were made in the Stanley Produce Stakes, which is for foals of 1913, and which will be run in 1914.

## BIG LEAGUES OPEN.

NEW YORK, March 11.—Schedule making of the nearly two score of national professional baseball leagues of the country is practically complete for the 1913 season, with a few departures from the general program followed last year.

The first pennant race is to be started as usual by the Pacific Coast League, the last to close, the National League, opening April 1, is also opening day of last year comes April 1, but not only the commencement of the two major league seasons, but also those of the American Association and the Southern League.

Among the changes this year in the various league circuits there is the probable shift of the Fall River (Mass.) franchise to Portland, Maine, in the New England League; the return of Waterbury, Conn., to the old Connecticut League, which will be called the Eastern of New London, Conn. and the addition of Mass. and the loss of New Britain, which makes an eight, instead of a six-club, circuit and the addition of Atlantic City, N.J., and Chester, Pa., to the Tri-State League, which has lost Altoona and Johnstown, Pa.

In some of these shoes there is also a block of wood into which stiff bristles have been driven. This is an additional preventive against slipping, and strengthens the shoe. They are light and comfortable for the horse, and deaden the sound of the hoof.
