The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead quarter-section of available Dominion and in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applican: must appear in person at the Dominio: Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain

onditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within hine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain con ditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in ne vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months' residence in each

of three years after earning homestead patent; also fifty acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre: Duties—Must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fifty, acres, and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
