CANNONADING STILL CONTINUES VIOLENT

French Report Artillery Duels With Enemy at Great Many Points.

COMBATS IN VOSGES

Belgian Army Reports Revival in Activity by German Forces.

PARIS, Sept. 3, 10.45 p.m.—The following official communication was issued this evening:

"Cannonading of a violent character on both sides has occurred at a great many points, especially in Artois, in the Lorette and Neville sectors, between the Somme and Oise, also in the region of Fougerecourt, Danour and Tilly, in Champagne, in the vicinity of Souain, in the Argonne, on the front of Lorraine, in the Remabois Valley, and in the environs of Gondrexon and Chasseles.

BOMB FIGHTING AT DIXMUDE.

HAVRE, Sept. 3, 7.20 p.m.—The following statement on the operations of the Belgian army was made public today by the Belgian military authorities:

"Last night and this morning were quiet. During the afternoon marked activity was shown by the German army. Heavy bombing attacks occurred before Dixmude, in which we held the upper hand."

PLEASED AT PROMISES TO DROP SUBMARINES

Pope Benedict Willing to Support Neutral Prepared to End War.

ROME, Sept. 3, 4.40 p.m., via Paris, 3.40 p.m.—Pope Benedict today expressed pleasure over the fact that the diplomatic negotiations between the United States and Germany had resulted in a promise from Germany to modify her submarine warfare.

The pontiff was gratified to learn of the cordiality that marked the conversation between President Wilson and Cardinal Gibbons on Thursday, when the latter delivered to the president in Washington a message from Benedict XV dealing with peace.

The pontiff today he hoped everybody, both in Europe and the U. S., would be convinced that his constant prayer is for the ending of the war, and that his work in this direction is entirely disinterested, being inspired only by the teachings of Christ and his love for humanity. He added that he would be ready to give the whole support of the Catholic Church to the person, institution or country that undertook the noble mission of ending the war, "which dishonors our generation by the inextinguishable stain it places on modern civilization."

London Unit in Training, Will March to Stratford and Back.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—The 34th Battalion, C.E.F., in training, left here at 10 o'clock this morning in heavy marching order for a tramp to Stratford and back, 84 miles in all. The battalion, 1250 strong, in command of Lieut.-Col. Oliver, bivouacked tonight at Thorndale and will camp tomorrow night outside St. Mary's. The men will put on a big military demonstration at Stratford on Labor Day and are due back in camp here on Thursday morning next.
