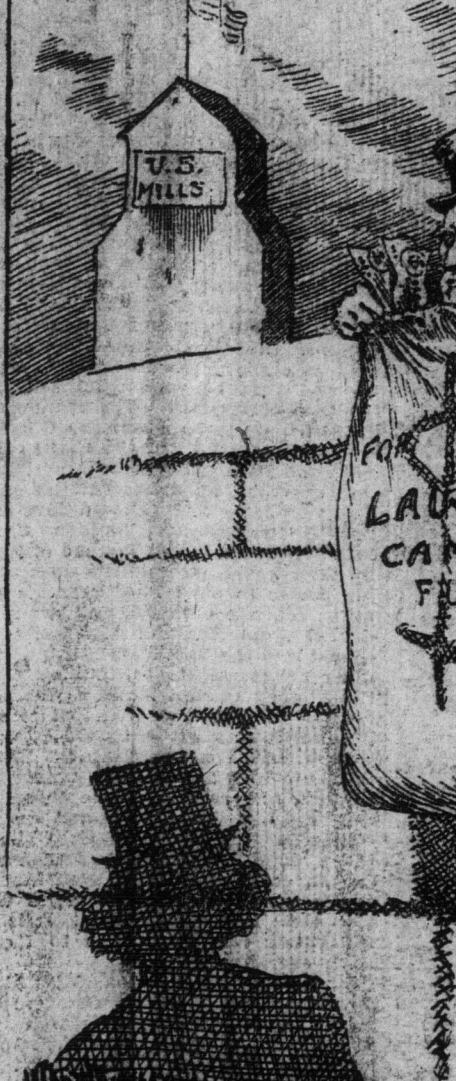
SQUARED VOTERS WITH PUBLIC MONEY
