



Merged With Telegraphs.

The inadequate telephone system previously owned and operated by the government will be amalgamated with the national system and run in connection with the telegraph system, which the government already owns. The government henreforth has an absolute monopoly of all public means of communication by mail, telephone and telegraph. This revolutionary change, which in America would be

declared socialistic, has been effected practically without criticism by the sultra Conservative press. In fact the new telephonic regime is welcomed on all sides, owing to the recognized in-efficiency of the service under its

former private management. Cheaper Service, Lower Cost. The government, which has had a imission of experts studying the commission of experts statigging the telephone service in other countries, especially in the United States pro-nises to introduce many new un-provements and give better service at

a lower cost. Already the government telephones are being installed in the private houses of London, giving subscripers the benefit of a single party wird for only \$25 a year. Subscribers at this rate, unlike New York subscribers, are entitled to call any other subscriber in the Metropolitan area, embracing a population of over seven millions.


