Binkley was always sure; he booted excellently when it seemed almost impossible, and thruout the day he only made one fumble, and it was not costly. Smirile Lawson, Binkley and O'Connor were much superior to Brophy, Balley and Smith, the Montreal halves. Argos were strong on tackling, Doc Newton evidently training the boys to do the flying thing, which they generally did with effect. Never once did Montreal get sway for a big gain of yards. Smith scored their only touch, which was converted by Balley, by intercepting a pass at the Argonaut ten-yard line. O'Connor played an excellent game at right half, taking all kinds of chances, tackling well, and making good runs. Lawson was as effective as ever. His speed, weight and straight-arm jab simply subdued the Montrealers. The locals have won two and lost one and are playing better every game.
