CRABBLE PROVED NO PUZZLE TO BINGOS

Leafs Failed to Find Local Hurler and Lost Second Game by Five Runs.

Binghamton, N.Y., May 9.—Binghamton took the second game of the series by hitting Crabble hard at opportune times, and added by misplays by the Toronto infield, won by the score of 5 to 3. The game was full of hard hitting, and both teams had good opportunities to score, but failed to take advantage of the critical situations and took chances that were unnecessary, thereby injuring their chances of victory.

Toronto got the first score by Laid getting a two-base hit on the first ball pitched to center, followed by a sacrifice bunt, and he then scored on an error by Shields at first base. In their half of the inning, Binghamton started right in to find Crabble. Oakes fled out to Warhop, Zimmerman walked, Crabble swung around and heaved the ball, and Onslow to catch Zimmerman napping, but Onslow failed to field the low throw properly, and Eddie took second. Riley hit to Warhop, who got him at first, but Zimmerman, running hard, got safe at home when Onslow threw to Fisher to catch him was too low to stop.
