# READ SOCIALISTIC AT STRIKERS' TRIAL

Thought Toronto Labor Was Rebelling.

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, Dec. 7.-Extracts from socialistic propaganda were read at the trial of R. B. Russell on Satruday afternoon. A. J.
