SELLS FOR \$100,000 CASH.

E. B. Oster, M. P., Secures the Odd-fellows' Hall Property.

The Toronto Mortgage Company yesterday sold to E. B. Oster, M. P., the property known as "Oddfellows' Hall" at the northwest corner of Yonge and College-streets, consisting of a four-story solid brick building, standing on 80 x 126 feet of land. The sum of \$100,000 cash was paid.

Whether it is the intention to open a branch there for the Dominion Bank, of which Mr. Oster is president, or whether it is his intention to hold this property for private investment is not stated.

From the Mortgage Company's point of view, it is regarded as an advantageous sale, as they have recovered the full amount of capital invested when the building was erected some 14 years ago, together with all back interest, charges, commissions, etc.

MAY BUILD HOSPITAL.

A bill to incorporate the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives was passed yesterday by the private bill committee of the legislature, sections being added to provide that all plans for a new hospital building be submitted to the provincial secretary to be sent on to the provincial board of health, and that municipal councils be authorized to contribute to the hospital funds.

GRENADIERS ON PARADE.

Large Turnout Last Night—Rifle Range Competition Results.

The Royal Grenadiers' usual weekly drill was held last evening at the armory, Major A. E. Gooderham in command. Notwithstanding that it was the evening before a holiday there was a very good muster—465 of all ranks, including recruits, being on parade. Company and battalion drill was practised, the regimental bands meanwhile playing several selections in the armory.

Lieut.-Col. Stimson is out of town for a few days. Capt. Sloan has been transferred from command of F. Co. to the corps reserve. Gerald Kennis Riddell, gentleman, has been gazetted lieutenant provisionally. Seventeen men were taken on and 24 struck off the strength of the regiment.

NOT SATISFACTORY.

British Policyholders' View of Mr. Choate's Recommendation.

London, April 12.—A meeting of the British policyholders of the Mutual Life Insurance Company has been called for April 20 to consider the reply of Joseph Choate, of counsel for the company, to the representations made in their behalf by A. D. Julliard, a trustee of the Mutual.

The meeting, which was held this morning thru Mr. Addison, counsel for the policyholders, was not satisfactory to those policyholders who were seen to-day. Mr. Choate says the proposals require careful legal consideration, and that in the meantime the trustees would be pleased to have the British policyholders appoint an actuary to verify the reserves and the liabilities.

This, the policyholders say, is evading the issue. They are satisfied with the financial condition of the company, but demand change in the management, desiring particularly the retirement of those of the trustees who were closely associated with the McCordys.

NEARLY ASPHYXIATED.

Three Brockville People Have a Very Narrow Escape.

Brockville, April 12.—(Special.)—Mr. and Mrs. William Horton and little daughter, aged about five years, narrowly escaped death by asphyxiation this morning.

The timely arrival of a caller to see Mrs. Horton saved their lives. They were rooming at a boarding house, and were not called for breakfast, as Mr. Horton was not working.

The morning had advanced when an attempt was made to arouse them. Then it was found all three were unconscious from coal gas from the furnace which filled the room. For a time their recovery was doubtful, but finally they revived and were pronounced out of danger.

Mrs. Horton's condition necessitated her being removed to the hospital.

ALL COLLEGES OF ONTARIO IN NEED OF AN ENQUIRY

Sir Sandford Fleming, Chancellor of Queen's, Finds More Work for Commission.

Kingsport, April 12.—(Special.)—Sir Sandford Fleming, as chancellor of Queen's, in his address this afternoon at the medical convocation, urged that the Ontario government, out of regard for the educational interests of a large number of people of the province who do not live within the limits of Toronto, should cause an official enquiry to be made into the university system of the whole province of a similar character to that which has recently been made respecting the Toronto institution, and further, that pending this enquiry, educational legislation should be deferred.

This morning Mayor Mowat was informed that the minister of the interior has decided to establish an immigration office in Kingston. The mystery which has surrounded the disappearance of John Hinds, the carrier for the gas company, who disappeared suddenly last fall, has been cleared up. This afternoon his body rose to the surface in a slip at the foot of Queen-street, when a tug backed, and stirred the water.

The situation at the locomotive works remains unchanged. The men who were turned away from the office on Thursday morning are still at work with no immediate prospect of their returning.

The new act provides for such cases by permitting application to be made for what is called a working permit, to be issued by the mining recorder within sixty days after such application, provided the applicant gives the recorder evidence of valuable mineral in the land. A working permit gives the holder exclusive possession of the claim for six months, during which time he may, at the end of six months, if he has not made a discovery, the permit may be renewed for another term, and when discovery is made the ordinary law towards mining will go into effect. Those mining men who hold that crown ought not to insist upon discovery, but that first come should be first served.

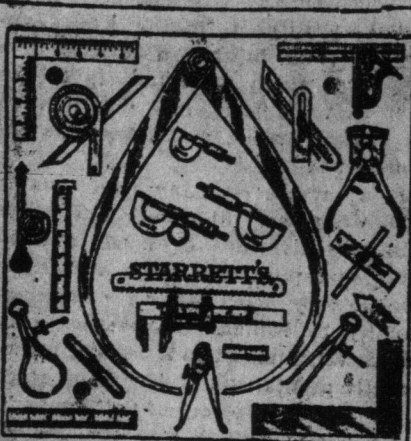
