If at the end of six months he has not made a discovery the permit may be renewed for another term, and when discovery is made the land mry be bought and patented in the ordinary way. 

This will abolish the nuisance of "silent partminers that they cannot enforce collection of their wages in the same way as mechanics, under the Lien Act. 


