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TAKES WIFE'S ASHES TO BANK

Had Been Told to Produce Her to Draw Dividends.

Chicago, Sept. 7.—Antony Przekopski this afternoon carried the ashes of his dead wife to the Milwaukee-avenue State Bank in a vain effort to get a small deposit that had been placed in the bank in his wife's name.

The man presented to Receiver Foster bank books and asked for payment of the dividend declared by the receiver.

"But that is in your wife's name," said the receiver.

"I know it," said the man.

"Well, she will have to come for the money herself. Do you understand me? She will have to be brought here."

"I have brought her."

"Where is she?"

"Here," said the man. He held aloft a small box. The receiver thought the man was crazed and started to call one of the special officers. Something in the visitor's earnest appearance, however, deterred him.

He slowly unfolded two papers.

The first was a certificate of his wife's death.

The second was a certificate that the tin box contained the ashes of his wife, who had been cremated.

"The company that cremated my wife placed her ashes in this box and gave me this certificate that it contained all that was left of her body," said the man.

BLAMED FOR WRECK; SUICIDES

Sept. of Traction Company Worried by Coroner's Jury Verdict.

Mattson, Ill., Sept. 7.—John O. Backus, assistant superintendent of the Central Illinois Traction Company, committed suicide by shooting to-day, following the verdict of a coroner's jury fixing on him the blame for a wreck on the road two days ago, in which the motor car was killed and several passengers seriously injured.

Farmers Lose by Fire.

Brockville, Sept. 7.—(Special.)—A disastrous fire took place on the farm of G. W. Shepherd, near Lovville when his barns were totally destroyed. Thirty-five cows were burned, also 200 tons of hay, sixty loads of grain, carriages, harness and farming implements.

An adjoining dwelling, the property of David Wetmore, was also burned.

Mr. Shepherd places his loss at \$5000, with \$5000 insurance. Wetmore carried an insurance of \$500 on his dwelling and contents. His loss is \$2000.

Kills Fellow Lunatic.
