## WHAT HAPPENED TO THE MILK FARMERS MAKE CONFESSION

Milk Pail Rinsings Went Into Can and So Did Water—Dealers Exonerated.

Ben Boylan and W. R. Harper were acquitted in police court yesterday on charges of selling impure milk. It was decided that the farmers from whom they received supplies were the ones to blame.

The farmers gave evidence. George Chadwick, after having been promised immunity from prosecution if he told the truth, admitted rinsing milk pails with about a quart of water and pouring the result into the can of "pure milk" sold in the city. He supposed that "a little water" got in the cans in this way. Wm. Lushner did something the same. He denied that he skimmed milk. He said he was positive that also had occurred.

Herbert Duncan said the supply of cream at home was obtained by taking a little off the top of filled cans. He also said he put a quart of water in the can each time when it wasn't full.

R. J. Armstrong, milk inspector, and Dr. A. R. Pyne, analyst, gave evidence as to the poor quality of the milk supplied. The latter thought 1 per cent water had been added to the milk.

The magistrate dismissed the cases against the dealers saying: "All these three farmers that have given testimony have been granted immunity from prosecution by me, but I won't say that this isn't a case for a civil action. We have learned the truth of the matter, and I don't believe that the wholesalers are to blame in this case. It was the farmers who skimmed and added the water."

Action by the health department will likely be taken in the county courts.

## SEVERN VILLAGE BURNED.

Entire Business Section Wiped Out by Fire.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 26.—Grave agrarian disorders have broken out in the Province of Viatka, the centre of disturbances being the important district of Malinsh, with a population of over 100,000, where the inhabitants of 70 villages are reported to have joined in the uprising, have disarmed and expelled the police and are pillaging and destroying the residences of the landowners and devastating the country.

Details are difficult to obtain, but it is rumored at Viatka that the administrative police chiefs in the Malinsh district, eight of their subordinates, have been killed. The excesses began Sept. 20, with a riot over the enrolment of army reserves for their autumn service.

Disorders have also broken out in the adjoining district of Chistolip, in Kazan Province.

## THE SCHOOLMASTER DOOMED.

The genius schoolmaster is threatened with extinction. The schoolmaster is rapidly supplanting him in the profession.
