SUSPENSION FOR SEVEN YEARS

Hamilton, March 14.—(Special.)—Rev.

Father Geoghegan of St. Peter's Church was to-day adjudged by the Court of Triers of being guilty of having illest intocourse with Miss Annie Hore on July 25last; and the sentence, concurred in by Bishop DuMoulin, is that Father Geoghe-gan is debarred for seven years from act-ing as an Anglican minister.

At noon to-day, in response to a summons from his lordship, there gathered at the office of Secretary Mason, Rev. Canons Sutherland, Clark and Forneret and Rural Dean Irving, who had been summoned to hear the sentence pronounced; Rev. Thomas Geoghegan, the accused, and Bishop Dumoulin, who presided over the proceedings. The verdict of the Board of Triers, together with the sentence imposed, were read to the accused, and were substantially as follows, the information being made public by J. V. Teetzel, Q.C., who had acted in a legal way for the plaintiff:

"That the Board of Triers finds that Rev. Thomas Geoghegan is guilty of the charge, and recommends that a sentence of seven years' suspension be imposed. In accordance with this recomposed. In accordance with this recomposed.

In accordance with this recom-nendation, it was ordered that Fatner leoghegan be, for the period of seven cars, suspended from all discharge of he functions of his clerical office and he execution thereof, that is to say from preaching the word of God, ad-ministering the sacraments or celebratministering the sacraments or celebrating or performing any other duties or offices in the Church of St. Peter's parish in the city of Hamilton or elsewhere; said suspension of seven years to be reckoned or computed from this date, at the end of which time the disability shall cease, and that during such suspension the stipend of the Rev. Thomas Geoghegan derived from the said parish shall be withheld from him, and used to pay for the services of another clergyman in such parish."

12, 1852, in Leeds County, Ont. His father was John Wood, a railroad contractor, who came to Canada from Dundee, Scotland, and settled at Brockville.

name for himself, in his profession, being made Q.C. in 1890. He was a member of the firm of Wood & Stewart, barristers, Brockville. He was solicitor for the Counties of Leeds and Grenville, and solicitor for the Brockville Building and savings Society. He was likewise vice-president of the Brockville, Westport and Sault Ste. Marie Railroad, which was subsidized by the Dominion Parliament in 1885. In 1882 Mr. Wood offered himself for the Dominion Parliament for Brockville, and was ejected.

He was re-elected at the general elections in 1887, 1891 and 1896. He was chairmin of committees and Deputy-Speaker of the House of Commons in 1890, and Chairman of the Committee on Railways and Canals in 1892. On Dec. 6, 1892, he was appointed Controller of Inland Revenue, and tesigned in July, 1896.

When the bill drafted by the member for West Toronto was first mooted it met with much opposition from many employers, but as its provisions have come to be better understood it is seen that whatever fault may be found with some of the details the principle of the measure is sound and in the interest not of the employes merely, but of fair-minded employers as well.

A Talk With Mr. P. W. Ellis.

Yesterday The World called upon Mr. P. W. Ellis, the head of the famous firm of manufacturing jewellers, and asked him how he, as a large employer of the kind of labor likely to be affected by them, regarded the two measures. Mr. Ellis had no hesitation in glving his views for the benefit of the readers of The World.

"A just and reasonable Compensation for Injuries to Employes Act." Mr. Ellis said, "should be welcomed by both employers and employes, as it would be beneficial to both." Mr. Crawford's bill he considered a move in the right direction. It is based upon the principle which underlies the British and German and other-foreign laws, that the business that creates the accidents is much better able to bear the financial loss caused by accident than is the injured workman, and that the business should pay the loss occasioned by an accident to an employe just the same as it does the loss due to an injury to machinery.

Not a Charge Upon Charity.

"Besides," continued Mr. Ellis, "workmen injured in the course of their employment.

"Besides," continued Mr. Ellis, "workmen injured in the course of their employment should not be humiliated by being made a charge upon charity." The present system of employers' liability insurance he considered wrong; "wholly wrong," he added emphatically. However much a workman may be entitled to compensation for injury, the insurance company will pay nothing except what the courts, after a suit, may compet them to pay. In effect, the company mersely agrees to help the employer fight his empioye in the courts, and thus, besides entailing great and needless expense, causing bifterness, ill-feeling, and often permanent loss of employment.

Employes claiming compensation under the act should be required, he thought, to give notice to the employer within three menths of the occurrence of the accident, instead of six as provided in the bill, and a want of such notice, besides not being a bar to proceedings, as Mr. Crawford provides, should not prejudice an employer's defence. Another Clause to Be' Modified.

The clause in the bill requiring employers to notify the Provincial Secretary within ten days, in cases of accidental injuries to workmen. Mr. Ellis thought, should be modified. The injured employes should be first required to rotify the employer, who should then be required to notify the Provincial Secretary within a reasonable time, say six weeks.
