AID. SPENCE ADVOCATES A CIVIC LIGHTING PLANT FOR TORONTO

He Has Collected Much Information From European and American Cities to Show the Utility of the Plan.

Council Passes Upon the Street Lighting Contract—Aldermen Are Afraid the Waterworks Bylaw For \$400,000 For New Pumping Plant Will Be Voted Down—Better Civic Contracts Wanted.

The anticipation of the Works Committee is that there will be another great slaughter of money bylaws in January. The committee, feeling concerned for the interests of the city, are desirous of saving the city from the enormous mass of the requirements of the Waterworks, estimated by the City Engineer at \$400,000 odd, Aid. Spence, perhaps, the only exception. He repeated the point, which he has already expressed that repairs would make the present engine serviceable enough, and that, their fuel consumption may be extravagant as compared with the class-up-to-date engines, it is better to go along with them than embark on the expenditure recommended by Engineer Rust.

Crane Says Rust's Danger.
Ald. Crane is an alderman who takes a keen personal interest in the affairs of the city. He said the citizens do not realize the danger of the existing condition of the engine, and that the expenditure of the waterworks, as against the Exhibition, the sanitation and other by-laws looms up if they only understood where they were at.

The better the aldermen could think of doing was to defer the necessities of the pumping plant, until all the other by-laws have been slaughtered and then show the citizens clearly that the proposed expenditure is an absolute necessity.

Better Civic Contracts.
Ald. Sheppard had a motion passed that Council makes known a clear understanding of the public contract. Several members of Council had expressed what is the undeniable fact, that the city specifications are of an elastic kind, and are drawn to the highest possible tension, which the actual work in no case can stretch out to. Ald. Sheppard moved that the Committee on Works investigate public contracts with this matter in view. The proposed investigation was unanimously thrown over on the Board of Control in which form Ald. Sheppard voted for it. This line of investigation ought to have some practical beneficial results.

Municipal Lightings.
Ald. Spence is of the opinion that municipalization of the city lighting supply is coming. He has been making a special study of this problem in Great Britain and the United States, and he gave The World yesterday some interesting facts which he had collected.

The alderman said: "In view of the proposal to acquire and operate a municipal gas plant in Toronto, the experience of other countries in such undertakings is of interest and value. Much progress has been made by Great Britain in what is there called municipal trading, that is, the exercise of industrial functions by municipal authorities. It is common for Old Country cities to have gas works, electric light plants, water works and street railways. In gas undertakings alone, there has been an increase in municipal investment in 1899 of \$1,147,000 pounds sterling over the amount so invested in 1898. Official returns are published by the Government from time to time, giving particulars of the capital invested, income and outlay of the water, gas, tramway, electric lighting and other reproductive undertakings, carried on by municipal boroughs. These returns show that in 1899 the amount invested in gas works was \$1,147,000 pounds sterling, of which \$647,145 was repaid, or set aside in sinking funds."

The British Investigation.
"Early in the present session the House of Lords and the House of Commons each appointed five members to constitute a joint committee to inquire into and report on the principles which should govern the powers to be given to municipal authorities for carrying on industrial enterprises.
