ALBANI IS STILL POPULAR ABSOLUTE

The French-Canadian Prima Donna Pleased a Large Audience in Massey Hall.

ADELA VERNE CARRIED OFF LAURELS

a Planiste of the Highest Order-Program Might Have Been Better Chosen.

The audience at Massey Hall last evening as of such dimensious as to remove all oubt of Madame Albani's continued popuarity. At an early hour quite a crowd had gathered on the steps in front of the hall, altho there was room for a few more in the body of the house, yet a splendid audience

It is to be regretted that the organizers f concerts will insist on displaying such ndifference to the wants of the people. Nearly every program consists mainly of items foreign to the audience, or too classical for common understanding. Beethoven's retretter Sonata," for instance, is not by any means the most popular nor the best known of his works, and even the few to

any means the most popular nor the best known of his works, and even the few to whom it is familiar have probably never round the real extent of its beauty. If only programs were printed containing detailed descriptions of these classical items, with short excepts from the main themes reproduced, such programs would have a high educative value, and the additional cost would be but trifling.

Not all music composed by the old masters is equally good, and some of their works might very well be dispensed with. Rossim's "Largo et Factotum," sung by Mr. Albert Archdeacon last night, is weak, both as a nusteal composition and as an expression of thought. Mr. Archdeacon has a good voice, but he should not abuse it by singing such trifles as this spasm of Rossin's. There was a little more excuse for Mozart's "L'Amero," because this is a delicate piece of melody, such as only Mozart could write. There is no mistaking the beautiful little "subject" in this composition, and when emphasized by Madame Albani's clear tones of the higher register, and supported by the counter-melody so beautifully interwoven by Madame Langley's violin, one forgot it was not set to linglish words.

Madame Albani has a charming personality, that is always the same. Her little mannerisms are suggestive of French Canada, and her evident delight in giving delight always puts an audience in good humor. Her voice was not heard to the best advantage last evening, and, tho it has lost nothing of its individuality, still she is not the singer she was when the writer last heard her in Manchester, England, some four years ago. Her best item by far was Braga's "Serenata," and one knows not when to lay the greatest compriment on A'bani's singing or Madame Langley's exquisite violin obligato, which in this composition is really the main theme. It would have lost nothing, however, if Madame Albani had sung the English version, "The Angel's Song," for in the closing bars the Saxon interpretation is far more impressive than the original, to English-speaking people at leost.

The most pleasant memory of Albani the writer has is of an occasion some years ago, when she sang in the Royal Albert Hall, South Kensington. To carry an audience to enthusiasm in that vast auditorium has been the achievement of but few, yet Albani has accomplished it many times, dividing honors once with the late beloved Madame l'atey. Madame Albani's upper notes still retain their usual purty.

Miadame Pattey. Madame Albani's upper notes still retain their usual purity, her lower middle register has lost some of its wonted elasticity. The laurels of the evening must go to Miss Adela Verne. She is a planiste of the highest order, and evidently takes as much pleasure in her work as the audience derives from it. Miss Verne's powers of expression are wonderful, and her slight elmost girlish figure emphasizes rather than detracts from the impression created by her fortissimo passagos. The Chopin nocturne was her best work, and it would need more than a critic to find any single fault with it. The "Concert Study" by Diemer, is her favorite, so she told The World's representative, but it is not her best work. 
