CURTAILMENT OF ORATORY

Some Presbyterian Clergymen Talk Too Long, Some People Think,

Hamilton. June 19 .- At the opening of the sederunt of the General As-sembly this morning, the opinion was expressed that some of the commissioners had talked too long in dis-cussing reports presented, and the committee on bills and overtures suggested that hereafter speakers make their speeches shorter. TEMPORARY PREACHERS.

Quite a discussion arose over the report of the committee on the distribution of probationers, presented by Rev. Dr. Torrance. The filling of vacant pulpits throughout the assembly limits and keeping an account of the men available for this class of work, are the principle duties of this committee, and interesting clauses of this report were as follows: "Your committee began this year with 22 names on the roll. To these eight were added at their meeting in September, three in December, three in March, and one since, making a total of 37. Of these eleven had settlements either in mission fields or regular pastoral charges; four have withdrawn, five have been removed for one cause or another, and there are now seventeen on.

'Of the full list three names were sent in by the Presbytery of Hamilton, six by that of Barrie, the same by Toronto, two each by the Pres-byteries of Brockville, Peterboro, London, Kingston and Sarnia, and one each by Stratford, Guelph, Orangeville, Portage La Prairie, Calgary, Melita, Ottawa, Maitland, Halifax, Lindsay and Saugeen, one name not yet cer-

The report further stated that the Presbyterians had not been loyal to the committee, and Rev. Dr. Milligan, in moving the adoption of the report, pointed out, at some length, the value of the system. He held that the scheme was the best that could be adopted for the filling of vacancies, and he deplored the fact that many were prone to think that a man placed on the probationers' list immediately became practically a nobody. The scheme, at any rate, was far better than the guerilla warfare carried on by some churches in the effort to fill

A scheme brought in by the committee for the definition of its duties, and those of Presbyteries and probationers, in line with the purposes of the committee, including a table of robationers' remunneration, was referred to a committee.

Halifax was the place chosen for the next meeting of the general as-sembly, that being the only place which extended an invitation. The report of the Sabbath school was presented by Rev. Dr. Fotheringham. It showed there are 2,500 schools, 19,000 teachers and 160,000 scholars.

BIBLE CONFERENCE

Interesting Meetings in Progress at the Auditorium.

The first meeting of the conference now being conducted by instructors of the Toronto Bible Training School was held yesterday afternoon in the audi-

torium of the Y. M. C. A. Rev. Dr. Smith, of the First Methodist Church, presided, and interesting and helpful addresses were delivered by Dr. Stewart on the "Names of God in the Old Testament," and by Dr. Harris on the "Epistle to the Hebrews." There was a good attendance from the different churches, and the audience, Bible in hand, followed very closely the clear and suggestive instruction of the lecturers.

This afternoon the conference is continued in the same place, with the well-known Dr. Wardrope, of Guelph, an ex-moderator of the Canada Presbyterian Church, and Dr. Stewart as the speakers. Topight will be in some respects the chief meeting of the series, with Drs. Wardrope and Harris conducting the exercises. Tomorrow afternoch at 3 o'clock, will be held the closing meeting of the session, with Dr. Harris and Dr. Stewart as lecturers, the latter dealing with the very important and practical theme of "How to Study the Bible." The meetings are growing in interest, and the Y. M. C. A. of the city have done a good work in arranging such a conference for Bible students and Christian workers.

UNION LABEL AN THE SENATE

J. D. O'Donoghue's Plea for the Bil -Supported by Hon. David Mills-The Senate Hostile.

[C. P. R. Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, June 20 .- The union label bill came up again today before the senate committee on banking and commerce. D. J. O'Donoghue, Toronto, pointed out that the adoption of the bill would materially assist in relieving the working classes from the growing evils of the sweating system, unduly low wages, long hours and labor under unsanitary condition. Mr. O'Donoghue denied, as suggested by Senator Mc-Mullen, that the bill would dictate as to how business men were going to run their establishments. He (O'Donoghue) here made an earnest plea for the bill pointing out that the laboring classes had been asking for legislation for six years, and it was not yet obtained. Senator McMullen did not think that

Mr. O'Donoghue would live long enough to see the bill become law. Mr. O'Donoghue retorted that he might live longer than the senate.

The bill was allowed to stand over until Thursday next, but the senate is hostile.

Hon. David Mills supported strongly the union label bill. The jury have the case of Leon Boileau, at Hull assizes, charged with murdering his stepdaughter, before them, and cannot agree.
