## THE ITALIAN CAR WINS AUTO RACE

Foreign Light Machine Scores Nice Triumph at Savannah—Grand Prize Races To-Day.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 25.—A little Italian car, with four cylinders, that hummed like a giant bumblebee, and with an American driver at the wheel, to-day won the first international light car race ever held in this country. In doing so the car and driver set a high record of 32.6 miles an hour for the 108-mile journey, over a part of the circuit which to-morrow will be used by the grand prize racers at Savannah. The winning driver, Fred Millard of Boston, in a Lancia car, named after the famous combination. The elapsed time was 3 hours 45 minutes and 33 seconds.

Robert Burman, driving Buick car No. 8, finished second, more than six minutes behind the winner. L. B. Loring, seated at the throttle of Chambers-Detroit No. 1, fought his way into third place. E. E. Stewart, Buick No. 11, was fourth, and Al Poole's Italian Italia was fifth. Then came W. R. Burns, with crashing noise, in No. 9, finishing sixth, and Carl Kelsey, in No. 17, finishing seventh. Costello's Maxwell No. 13 and Tunweller's No. 15 were running in eighth and ninth positions, respectively, when the race was called off.

A crowd of many thousands filled the two big grand stands at the finish line, and other thousands lined the rectangular course on all four of its regular sides. While there were many minor mishaps to the cars, the only serious wreck came at the very close of the day's racing. Earl Miller, in No. 14, was driving along well when he lost the road and went crashing into a ditch. The mechanic, Frank Thompson, was hauled from the car and rendered unconscious. It was at first thought he had been killed, but later he regained consciousness, and it was said tonight he would recover.
