GREATEST SEIZURE OF ARMS YET MADE IN RAID AT DUBLIN

Labor Party Shows Dissatisfaction With U.F.O.-Labor Government

U.F.O. AND ROLLO ARE CRITICIZED BY LABOR CONVENTION

Provincial Independent Party Also Scores Own Administration in Legislature.

MEETING AT WELLAND

Welland, March 25.—(Can. Press.)—The main features of the fourth annual convention of the provincial independent labor party, which was opened at Welland today, was the strong criticism of the United Farmers' administration, the members of the Labor party in the house, and Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor, in particular.

The delegates manifested much interest in the report of the commission which investigated conditions at the Chippawa at the time of the strike last May, and a resolution was tabled, asking for the bringing down of the report together with the opinion of the government on it, or if any pronouncement had been made on it. It was also asked if the government are going to adjust the conditions in harmony with the commission's findings.

Makes Halcrow Sick. Delegate Halcrow of Hamilton stated that the Hydro was a municipal, and not a provincial undertaking. Some labor men made him sick, he declared, demanding an eight-hour day and then being willing to work all kinds of hours to get more money.

Secretary Marks asked, who were the three members who were mentioned as coming into the Hydro matter when trouble began at the Chippawa. Delegate Marsh replied that they were Swayzee, Macbride and Green-faw.

EASTER CELEBRATED BY MORE BLOODSHED

Manager of Cork Manufactory Is Shot Dead in His Home.

Dublin, March 25.—The Easter season saw no abatement of the bloodshed in Ireland.

John Cathcart, manager of a large manufacturing company in East Cork, was shot dead by civilians, who broke into his house early today.

Reports of the shooting were that the four young men, with several others, were taken from the house and ordered to run for their lives. Five were directed upon them, it was said, four of them being shot and the others escaping.

Cut All Wires. Belfast, March 25.—Sinn Feiners invaded the railroad station at Glarryford, County Antrim, this morning, seized the telegraph and telephone instruments and cut the wires leading from the place. A wide district has been cut off from communication.

Accused of Trespassing. George Dennis, 165 Bathurst street, and Victor Brothel, Philander, no home, were arrested last night by C. P. T. Constable Odium, charged with trespassing. Fourteen men worked in the lumber camps up north, and have beaten their way back on freight trains.

CHILD IS KILLED MOTORIST HELD

Six-Year-Old Wilson Russell Is Victim—Hudson to Face Manslaughter Charge.

Struck by a motor car at Dundas and Munro streets at 4.30 yesterday afternoon, six-year-old Wilson Russell, 160 Hamilton street, was badly injured, dying in the Hospital for Sick Children at 3.05 p.m. last night.

Hudson, the police alleges, was driving his automobile east on Dundas street on the wrong side of the street. The child ran from behind another auto, standing at the curb, and was struck down. The police ambulance was summoned and removed the lad to the hospital.

COURT TO DECIDE PROCEDURE TO GET NAMES ON LIST

Will Rule Whether Personal Attendance of Would-Be Voters Necessary.

VIEWERS ARE VARIED

In many quarters the interest in the forthcoming referendum vote has been greatly increased by the mix-up on the legal aspect of the voter's list. There are wide differences of opinion between Col. O. M. Biggar, K.C., chief electoral officer, who has declared that any applicant for a vote must appear in person and be examined by the revising officer under oath, and Judge Coatsworth, chief returning officer for Toronto and York county, who is decidedly in support of the opinion that a revising officer can name and certify to by an affidavit, and that personal attendance is not necessary.

It is possible to get all sorts of opinions to support either side, and as it is necessary that the law on the subject should be generally known, the Citizens' Liberty League are supporting George Moore in the writ he has issued against Judge Coatsworth and the revising officers asking for an injunction against them to restrain the placing of any names on the voters' list except by personal application.

The World last night saw I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., president of the Citizens' Liberty League, who said the only object of the injunction was to ascertain really how the law stood on the subject. If the revising officers put names on the lists on bloc, as the referendum committee wanted them to do, and it was afterwards found that it was illegal, the whole vote might be upset, and no one wanted that to happen, said Mr. Hellmuth.

STRIKE OF TUG MEN HAS BEEN CALLED OFF

New York, March 25.—The coastwise strike of marine engineers and officers on ocean-going tugs, began yesterday in protest against wage reductions, was called off today by union officials, following the receipt of a telegram from the department of labor offering conciliation.

SEND BACK REPLY ON REPARATIONS

Commission Refuses to Accept It and Germans Will Draft Another.

Berlin, March 25.—The German delegation here today delivered to the allied reparations commission the German reply to the note sent by the commission yesterday giving Germany warning of the infliction of penalties under the peace treaty unless she paid before May 1 the twelve billion gold marks balance of the 20,000,000,000 of the treaty.

MASKED BANDITS HOLD UP WORKERS AT A HYDRO CAMP

Three Desperadoes Rob 36 Canal Men at Queenston of \$2,000.

FOLLOWS THE PAY DAY

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 25.—(By Canadian Press)—Three masked men, armed with revolvers, entered the Hydro canal camp, below Queenston, near the power house site, late last night and, at the point of the guns, held up the boarding house boss and 35 of the inmates, making away with around \$2,000. No trace of them was found. When they entered the boarding house they fired two shots in the air and so quietly that the motor man had no suspicion that anything was wrong. The provincial police are working on both cases.

BOY SHOT DEAD IN DON VALLEY

Older Boy Arrested on Charge of Criminal Negligence After Inquiry.

Running in front of a rifle in the hands of Harold Holmes, aged 15 years, West St. Clair avenue, who had aimed at a groundhog, Cloy Tupling, aged 9 years, 354 Soudan avenue, was at two o'clock yesterday afternoon shot thru the head and almost instantly killed. Holmes was arrested on a charge of criminal negligence by County Constable McMullen and Detective Crowson, and locked up in the Children's shelter.

POLICE TAKE CITIES IN CENTRAL GERMANY AFTER HARD FIGHTING

Communists Made Desperate Resistance and Firing Was Incessant—Reds Constantly Reinforced by Peasants and Villagers—Police Blame Entente.

Berlin, March 25.—Advices received tonight from the disturbed industrial areas in middle Germany state that the police recaptured Eisleben and Hettstedt from the communists after a hard-fought battle. The communists have taken possession of large nitrogen works in Leuna, near Halle, where they are reported to have formed a Red army of 6000.

Leaders of the communists at Eisleben, the advice added, were overthrown and fighting in the Mansfeld district has ceased.

GREAT STORE OF ARMS CAPTURED IN DUBLIN IN RAID BY MILITARY

Bootleggers' Feud Stirs Up Lewiston

Three Intending Emigrants Guarded by Sinn Feiners Also Found—All Are Detained—Capture Included All Kinds of Equipment and Munitions, Pompano, Eighteen-Pound Shells and Bombs of All Sizes—Many Rifles and Revolvers.

Dublin, March 25.—The capture of a large quantity of arms, ammunition and seditious literature and also three intending emigrants to the United States, who were found guarded by four members of the "Irish Republican Army," was reported in two official statements issued from general headquarters today.

The statements, which told of raids made early today by the auxiliary police, said the four Sinn Feiners also were taken.

The first statement reads: "During the course of a raid carried out early this morning by auxiliary police on stables behind Great Charles street, Dublin, the following articles were found: Fifteen revolvers, six rifles, six shotguns, 400 rounds, 1,000 rounds of small arm ammunition, twelve 18-pounder shells, a pompano, a quantity of detonators, a lead telephone, various articles of military and rebel equipment, a large quantity of seditious literature, three motor cars, each containing a quantity of captured arms and ammunition, and two motor cars.

The second statement says: "During a raid by police early today seven men were found under suspicious circumstances at No. 100 Seville place, Dublin. Investigation showed that three were intending emigrants to the United States, while the other four were rebel policemen, who were guarding them with the object

REWARDS OFFERED IN BOMB OUTRAGE

Thirty Thousand Lire for the Discovery of Authors of Milan Explosion.

Milan, March 25.—The government has offered a reward of 20,000 lire and the proprietor of the Diana Theatre, in which a bomb explosion caused the death of 31 persons and the injury of 100 others recently, has offered 10,000 lire for information leading to the arrest of the bomb thrower.

More than 100 anarchists already have been arrested in connection with the outrage. Amelio Astolfi, the 18-year-old youth arrested yesterday on suspicion of having been concerned in the outrage, today denied that he knew who threw the bomb and also denied any connection with the bomb explosion in the electric works here early yesterday.

After the explosion in the Diana Theatre, according to the police, a cab containing four persons was driving in the direction of the office of the socialist newspaper, Avanti. A patrol of royal guards tried to halt the cab, but the driver was ordered to whip up the horse and the men escaped.

MARCUS STONE, R.A., DEAD; WAS CELEBRATED ARTIST

London, March 25.—Marcus Stone, R.A., the famous artist, died today. Mr. Stone was born in 1840. He exhibited in 63 consecutive exhibitions of the Royal Academy. He received medals from the international exhibitions in Philadelphia, Chicago, Paris, Berlin and Vienna. He was a painter of subjects of human interest and historical genre.
