F., Nov. 3.—In order to avoid the possibility of any legal defect or technicality vitiating the proposed test cases which the Newfoundland government intends to bring against colonial fishermen employed on board of the American herring vessels to determine whether the modus vivendi arranged between the United States and Great Britain is valid or otherwise, the government will send competent legal counsel to the west coast to arrange for these prosecutions, to draft the necessary papers and to oversee the enforcement of the Bait Act. It is the purpose of the government to carry these cases to the privy council if necessity arises.
