TAKING A WIFE.—Mr. H. a rich English
gentleman, who in the first year of the Greek
insurrection was making a scientific tour in
Egypt, happened to be at Cairo when a Greek
girl, from Candia, nine years of age, was of-
fered for sale. Mr. H. bought the child, sent
her to England, and had her educated with
great care; and when she had attained the
age of 15, married her. On the 7th Septem-
ber, Mr. H. with his wife, arrived from Malta,
and went to her native place, in the interior
of the island, to let her parents take part in her
fortune. They were not a little astonished to
see their daughter, after a separation of nine
years, as a lady of consequence, dressed like a
princess, and surrounded with servants, but
refused, however, to accompany her. The
Greek revolution affords many such episodes
which would furnish pleasing subjects for the
drama.

INSTINCT OF SPIDERS.—The following fact
is copied from a French work entitled Archives
sur l'Anatomie.—"A small spider had spread
its net between two neighbouring trees, at the
height of about nine feet. The three principal
points, to which the supporting threads were at-
tached, formed here as they usually do, an
equilateral triangle. One thread was attached
above to each of the trees, and the web hung
from the middle of it. To procure a third
point of attachment, the spider had suspended
a small stone to one end of a thread; and the
stone being heavier than the spider itself, served
in place of the lower point, and held the web
extended. The little pebble was five feet from
the earth." The whole was observed, and is
described by Professor Weber, of Leipsig.

A STAUNCH REFORMER.—A man who is now
a respectable tradesman in Chelsea, was for
many years one of the most profligate of the out-
cast pensioners of Chelsea Hospital, and was known
only as a common nuisance in the neighbour-
hood by his constant imbrication, suddenly took
it in his head to swear that for seven years he
would not taste of any liquid stronger than tea.
This oath he kept most inviolably, and by his
regularity obtained a friend who put him into
business. In November last the term of his
oath expired, and he anxiously looked forward
to the day that he might enjoy himself without
infringing upon his conscience. In fact he did
get as much intoxicated as he had ever been, but
on the next day renewed his oath for twelve
years, since which he has gone on in the steady

THE CAVE BEAR.—There is evidence, that
at one period of its history this island was in-
habited by a bear of much more formidable
size than the brown bear which is still found on
the Continent—that is the Cave Bear (Ursus
Spalceus) so called, because as a living animal
it is supposed to be every where extinct, though
its remains have been discovered in several
of those great caves in which the bones of animals
not now met with alive are often found.—
These remains occur in several places in Eng-
land, and give evidence that the animal, of
which they are now only the monument, must
have been at least the size of an ordinary horse.
