A basketball team from St. John High School defeated the senior team from St. Paul's church in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium last evening by a score of thirty-nine to eleven. Willett and Cochran starred for the winners.

For Championship.

Spokane, Wash., Mar. 12.—The Washington State College basketball team, champions of the northwest conference and probable title holders in the Pacific Coast conference, will compete in the National Amateur Athletic Union championship tournament in Chicago this month for the premier honors of the United States for 1916-17. An invitation from the A. A. U. to take part in the Chicago tournament has been acted upon favorably by the athletic council of the college, located at Pullman, eighty-five miles south of Spokane.

According to the plan, Coach Fred Bohrer and six players will be sent to the tournament. The dates for the annual championship have been set for March 15, 16 and 17, on the Central Y. M. C. A. floor.

The W. S. C. team suffered but one defeat during the season. California won a game from the state college knockout by taking the second game of the series from the U. of C. five. There is no chance to figure W. S. C. out for less than a tie with California for the Pacific coast conference title, and if the honor is awarded on a basis of games won and

lost, Washington state will get the title as it has competed in many more college games than California.

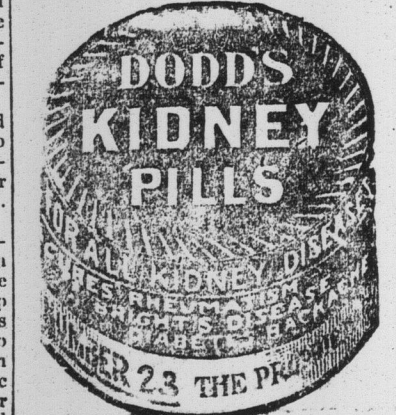
Mays Signs Contract

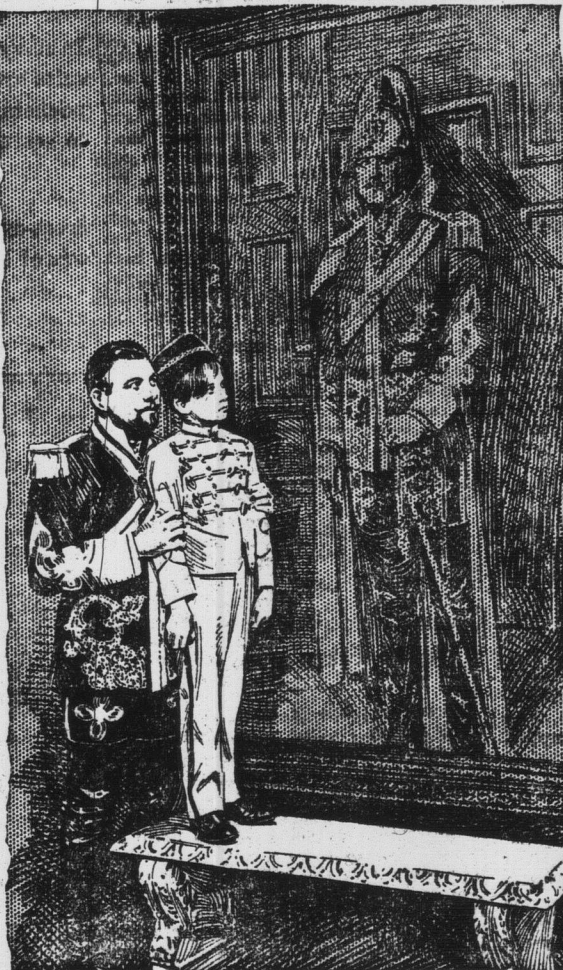
The boxing game is safe for another two years at least in Minnesota. The efforts to have the law repealed failed.

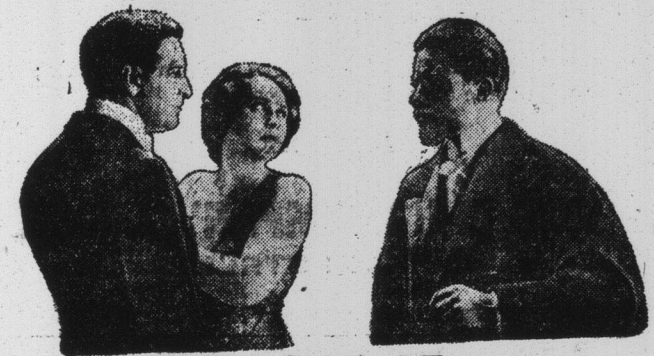

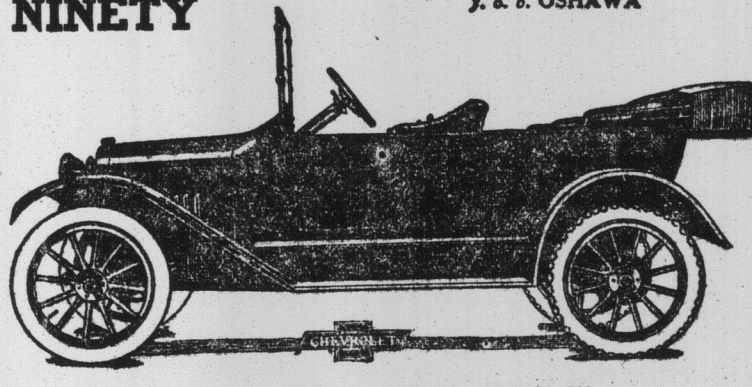
