W. M. McLean, inspector for school district No. 6, has appointed May 11 as Arbor Day in the public schools. The inspector urges the co-operation of parents and all others in the district.

W. D. Wilson, chief prohibition inspector, is expected in the city tomorrow morning and will be at the government rooms in Prince William street. It is understood that the names of the wholesale dealers will be given out then.

A liner reached the city yesterday and the officials on board related a thrilling story of being chased by a German submarine craft. The liner had stopped off the French coast to pick up a sailor in a boat, whose barque had been torpedoed. Here a submarine was sighted which gave chase. The liner, however, was able to get away. Seventeen shots were fired at the steamer.

TINS OF RUM SEIZED

(Halifax Recorder)

Inspector Tracey, last evening, seized some bottled ale in a camp at the Ocean Terminals. This morning, at North street station, he seized two cases of tins, which were marked varnish. Each case contained twelve gallon tins, which had over-proof rum. The packages were marked William Ferguson, and the address given was at a Halifax hotel. The inspector caused a warrant to be issued for Ferguson, but no such man was at the hotel whether as a guest or an employee. The inspector says that for the past fortnight or so he has seen many of these "varnish" tins in places where he searched, but they were always empty. He also seized 2½ barrels of other liquor at North street.

COUNTRY'S WELFARE FIRST

L. Kenney, coroner. On Saturday, Dr. Kenney empaneled the following jury: N. F. S. Springer, foreman; Arthur Presley, Wm. McCluskey, Archibald Trearnt, Silas Wright, Wm. E. Mollon and John DeAngelis. Alexander Long, who was driving the team which struck Mr. Riley, was released by Chief of Police Simpson, on Saturday.

Casualty List

Grows Longer in Memory of Battle of Ypres

The midnight casualty list contains the following New Brunswick men—Wounded, P. R. Davidson, Upper Blackville, shell-shock; J. Purdette, Tuxton, Gloucester county; C. K. Ganong; R. B. Williams, St. John; J. L. Ronan, Newcastle; L. B. Carson, Havelock; J. Fletcher, McGivney Junction; L. F. McDonald, Fredericton; H. Swin, Pembroke; J. R. Boyle, Waspie; T. Burgess, Dartmouth; R. Hallet, Hartland; B. F. Ramsey, St. John; A. C. Irving, Hillsboro; J. Lee Galley, Newcastle; J. A. Jesso, St. John; H. C. Griffiths, Norton, and G. R. Heenan, Scotch Ridge.

Mrs. Frank H. Leiford, of Glen Falls, received word yesterday to the effect that her husband, Gunner Frank Harold Leiford, artillery, was dangerously wounded on April 17 and has been admitted to No. 1 Casualty Clearing Station.

Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Hannington, of Victoria, B. C., that their only son, Lieutenant F. Carleton Hannington, had been wounded. Lieutenant Hannington was born in New Brunswick.

Mrs. Hannah Walsh, 877 Douglas avenue, yesterday received word from Ottawa to the effect that her son, Private Donald Herbert Walsh, had been killed in action. Besides his mother he leaves four brothers, Walter of Boston; James and William of this city; and Fred of Montreal; also four sisters, Mrs. James Garey, this city; Mrs. J. Sullivan, McAdam Junction, and Misses Annie and Edna at home.

Sergeant Leavitt Wounded.

Sergeant W. Ronald Leavitt, who went overseas with the 11th, and was later drafted into a distinctly New Brunswick unit, has been slightly wounded in the head. Word to this effect was received on Saturday by A. Gordon Leavitt. Sergeant Leavitt is a son of the late Robert T. Leavitt.

Word was received by Harvey Arbo, Sr., Milford Road, that his son, Ernest, had been wounded. He enlisted here with the 104th battalion but was drafted into another Canadian regiment on going to France. The official information stated that he was severely wounded in the hand.

William Kelleher, son of Patrick Kelleher, of Union Point, has been wounded severely in the side. Official information to this effect was received by his father yesterday from Ottawa. Nearly two years ago Kelleher and his brother, Timothy, enlisted together.

Word was received by his wife yesterday that James Goldie, of Milford had been wounded in the foot. Mr. Goldie enlisted here in a well known regiment, was drafted into another regiment on being sent to France, and later was in action with the Princess Pats.

W. A. Quinton has received word from his sister, Mrs. R. Ferguson, now living in Vancouver, that her two sons, John B. and Ralph C. Berteaux, had been wounded in the recent heavy fighting in France.

Officers of the Forestry Unit

Additional officers for Major Lionel Hannington's Forestry Company have been announced. They are as follows:—J. Stanley Scott, of Fredericton, a prominent lumberman of York county and well known throughout the province, will be one of the officers of this unit. An office has been opened in Fredericton under him and he will supervise the organization in Queens and Sunbury counties.

Lieut. Charles Smith, of the Tobique River, also an experienced lumberman and military officer, will be given an appointment with headquarters at Perth Junction, in Victoria county.

Capt. T. J. McMullin, of Canterbury, York county, who has also had long experience in the lumber business and command of a company in the 67th C. I., will also take a post with headquarters at Woodstock.

Lieut. W. M. Ferguson, of Campbellton, another man with lumbering and military experience, will organize and command a Restigouche county platoon. The recruiting for this unit will commence this week.
