**DIED IN BAR HARBOR**  
John McFarlane, of Chatham, went to Bar Harbor, Me., on last Wednesday, to attend the funeral of his niece, Miss Mildred Clarke, whose death occurred unexpectedly at her home there on Tuesday. She was nineteen years of age.

**SEVENTEEN MEN THIS A. M.**  
Seventeen men applied this morning to the standing medical board for examination. Of this number nine were put in Class A, one in Class B, four in Class C, none in Class D, and three in Class E.

**BRITISH RED CROSS**  
The cash actually paid in as a result of the Trafalgar day collections for the British Red Cross, has reached a total of \$86,500, but as the money still is coming in the total amount to be received will not be known until the books are closed.

**TO LAY NEW SEWER**  
A new twelve inch terra cotta sewer is to be laid in Paris street from a point near Rockland road to First street to provide needed facilities for a district which has been growing in recent years. The work was to have been started today but the weather interfered.

**IN CONSULTATION HERE**  
Captain R. V. Harris, military representative in connection with the Military Service Act for Military District No. 6, is in the city today in consultation with Lieutenant Roy Davidson, the military representative for this district with reference to their duties.

**NOVELTY SHOWER**  
Friends of Miss May Macaulay called at her home, 80 Brunswick street, on Sunday evening and tendered her a novelty shower in anticipation of her marriage which is to take place in the near future. Many beautiful and useful gifts accompanied the good wishes of her friends. The evening was enjoyed with games and dancing and a dainty luncheon was served.

**MISSION CONCLUDED**  
A mission which was conducted in St. Rose's church in Milford during the last week by Rev. P. McPhail, C. S. R., and Rev. F. Healey, C. S. R., was brought to a close last evening. An eloquent sermon on "Perseverance" was delivered by Father McPhail. His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc and Rev. F. Walker of the Cathedral were present. During the services Father McPhail gave the papal blessing to the congregation.

**THE FORTY HOURS**  
The Forty Hours devotion was commenced in St. Peter's church yesterday morning. Rev. J. Costello, C. S. R., was celebrant at solemn high mass, which was assisted by Rev. P. C. O'Hare, C. S. R., as deacon and Rev. F. Coughlan, C. S. R., as sub-deacon. Father O'Hare delivered an eloquent sermon appropriate to the occasion. At the conclusion of high mass a procession in honor of the Most Blessed Sacrament took place, the priests, altar boys, single and married men and children of the parish taking part. In the evening solemn vespers and benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament took place.

**NEVER VISITED HERE**  
Bob Fitzsimmons former champion pugilist, never visited St. John, but many local sporting men had seen him in action in the United States. The pictures of his battle with Corbett, shown in the Opera House here, were the first motion pictures of a ring contest exhibited here and one of the earliest of any "movies" seen in St. John. Fitzsimmons' feats, especially in 1881 when he defeated five men in one night, will not soon be forgotten. While he never visited St. John, other of the ring heavyweights have been here, including John L. Sullivan and Paddy Ryan.

**THE ENGINEER'S OFFICE**  
Discussing the office of city engineer, Commissioner Russell said this morning that his department required the permanent services of an engineer, but he did not see any need to appoint any one to the office of city engineer. Three of the city departments required engineers for specific and widely differing work, and he did not see that it would add to their efficiency to call one of them by the title of city engineer; neither did he see that there would be enough work to warrant the employment of an additional official to be styled the city engineer and to act in a consulting capacity.

**ROBBERY CASE IN POLICE COURT**

**Held-Up in Mill Street Restaurant**

**CIRCUS FOLLOWER IN TROUBLE**

**Matter of Watches in Show Concession—Two Liquor Cases—Bring Fines of \$208 Each or Eight Months in Jail**

The police court was crowded this morning at the hearing of several cases before Magistrate Ritchie. William Benway and John Conlin were charged with breaking and entering the restaurant of John Shing in Mill street last night and stealing \$41.31 from the till. Inspector Caples first called the son of the proprietor, Charles Ching. He said that these two men had been there periodically since the Bistany shows came to the city and that last night they went in about 7.30 and stayed until midnight. They were put out and in a few minutes returned and knocked at the door. The witness said that he let them in and that both then showed revolvers and said "Hands up!" One of them had a white cloth over the lower part of his face. The taller one, Conlin, stepped to the till and pushed the "no sale" key, taking money from the till. The witness said he went to the kitchen and told John Sing, another Chinese, to get his gun as there were robbers in the shop, but they got away before Sing could get there with the revolver. Conlin asked the witness about some conversation at the police station last night and Sing admitted saying that he did not know whether Conlin committed the robbery or not. The case was postponed until the prisoners could obtain legal advice.

John London, a Russian, charged with stealing four rolling tables and twenty watches from Leo Bistany of the Bistany Shows was brought up this morning and Mr. Bistany went on the stand. He said that the prisoner had run a concession table and that when the shows closed on last Saturday he sent a boy to see if London's goods were still there. The boy reported that they were not and then Bistany went to the train and asked London about them. London said that he knew nothing about it. Later a warrant was sworn against him and he was brought back from McAdam. The watches and tables, Mr. London said, were his and had been bought by his partner from London. London said that the tables were not his and that he had sent them to Mrs. Edson, in New York. He said he knew nothing about the watches, but that they were not worth the \$300 on them. He said he had bought them in Sydney for \$2. Preliminary hearing was to be resumed probably this afternoon.

Two men charged with drunkenness pleaded guilty and were given \$8 or two months in jail each.

Muriel Vernon, a dancer with the Bistany Shows, who was last night unable to give a satisfactory account of herself and was arrested by Policemen Gibbs and Cooper, was allowed to leave the city this morning by order of the chief of police.

James McDermott pleaded guilty to being drunk in Dock street on Sunday morning and having liquor in his possession. He said at first that he got it in Sussex. He was fined \$208 or five months in jail. Later he confessed to buying the liquor from another of the prisoners in court on a charge of drunkenness, William Mulcahey, and said that he paid \$3 for a bottle. Mulcahey was then given \$208 fine or eight months in jail.

His Honor said that the condition of the streets in the city was becoming disgraceful and that if matters were to continue as at present the late government might just as well not have passed the prohibition act.
