Germans Fail In Attacks on Somme

London, Oct. 26, 4.17 p.m.—The subject of Roumania was brought up again in the house of commons today, when Premier Asquith said that "the military situation of Roumania was engaging. the most anxious attention, not only of this government, but of those of our allies.

'They have taken and are taking now," he added, "every possible step to support our gallant comrades in Roumania in the splendid struggle they are making. I hope we shall not take unduly pes-simistic views. In Russia, France, England and Italy there have been and there are concerted measures in which each of us is doing all in his power to support Roumania in her struggle for independ ence.'

Turks in It, Too.

Constantinople, Oct. 25, via London Oct. 26-Turkish troops last Sunday night surprised the British camp near

night surprised the British camp near Sheikh Saad, on the Tigris river below Kut-El-Amara, and penetrated the British trenches, according to the official statement issued today by the Turkish war office. After capturing a quantity of arms and supplies, the statement adds, the Turks returned to their own posi-tions. The text reads: "Tigris front: We carried out a sur-prise attack Sunday evening against the British encampment in the neighbor-hood of Sheikh Saad, during which our troops penetrated the enemy trenches and returned victorious after capturing a quantity of arms and ammunition. "Dobrudja: Our troops with those of our allies continued their pursuit today of the defeated enemy, and entered Tchernavoda."
