

HIS POLITICAL CAREER By Gerrit Smith - New York.

From a letter to the constituents of his congressional district in 1832. From biography of B. O. Richardson, 1878.

NOMINATION, as I supposed it would, has resulted in my election, and that, too, by a very large majority. And now I wish that I could resign the office which your partiality has accorded to me.

- 1. That it acknowledges no law and knows no law for slavery; that not only is slavery not in the federal constitution, but that by no possibility could it be brought either into the federal or into a state constitution.
2. That the right to the soil is as natural, absolute and equal as the right to the light and air.
3. That political rights are not conventional but natural—inhering in all persons, the black as well as the white, the female as well as the male.

That as far as practicable, every officer, from the highest to the lowest, including especially the president and postmaster, should be elected directly by the people.

I need not extend any further the enumerations of the features of my peculiar political creed; and I need not enlarge upon the reason which I gave why I must not and cannot resign the office which you have conferred upon me.

TO BUILD HOMES FOR CITY WORKERS

Social Scheme That Has Proved Great Success in England to be Followed in Canada

(Montreal Star) Having proved an enormous success in the larger cities of England and Germany, ameliorating the housing conditions of the workers there without increasing their living expenses, a campaign will now be commenced in Canada, and particularly in Montreal, for the purpose of forming a co-operative building organization following the lines adopted in England.

The plan followed in England, briefly, were to form a company; by an estate of two to one hundred and fifty acres; build thereon self-contained cottages which would rent for prices but little higher than flats in the crowded tenement and slums districts. The venture is run along business lines and the investors in the common stock, many of whom are tenants, are guaranteed five per cent per annum on their investment.

Many social workers who have visited England and Germany have reached with the wonderful achievements reached through careful and concerted action. The plan followed in England, briefly, were to form a company; by an estate of two to one hundred and fifty acres; build thereon self-contained cottages which would rent for prices but little higher than flats in the crowded tenement and slums districts. The venture is run along business lines and the investors in the common stock, many of whom are tenants, are guaranteed five per cent per annum on their investment.

The association has gained many adherents. In many cases the work has been begun through wealthy friends of the movement who invest money for loan stock, on which two per cent is drawn. Later the common stock is subscribed, either by tenants or non-tenants, and the former, owning the stock take interest in the proper care and preservation of their homes. They are also able to dispose of their stock quickly in case it is necessary to move to another city, or for any other reason.

Through skillful planning the houses are arranged that to each dwelling a generous supply of light is received. The houses are not grouped regularly so that each dwelling stands with light on all sides. The streets on the estate, which is really a small town, are not wide, the most of the ground not occupied by houses being used for gardens or play grounds for the children of the tenants.

In England from six to twelve houses are allowed to an acre of ground and the rents range from six shillings a week upward.

An idea of the increase and success of the movement may be had from the capitalization of the affiliated societies. In 1888 the first society was opened with a capital of £200. At the conclusion of 1898 there were eleven affiliated societies in England with a total capitalization of £393,260.


