ADVERSE TRADE BALANCE SHOWS IMMENSE SUM

 Dollars in wages and untold inconvenience to business and suffering on the part of householders, was in the hands of the miners' executive this morning. Throughout last night and until 3 o'clock this morning, there were conferences between the coal committee of the cabinet and the executive committee of the coal mine owners and miners. These conferences grew out of a resolution adopted by the miners' delegate conference which gave the executive committee carte blanche to negotiate a settlement of the strike without imposing stipulations with regard either to hours or wages. The discussions were friendly and regarded as being full of hope.

TERMS GIVEN OUT.
 The Government's memorandum was given out early this morning. The main point at issue, the question of increasing miners' hours of work beyond the statutory 7 hours daily was conceded in principle yesterday. The contingent question of district settlements for both hours and wages also was conceded. The memorandum concludes both these points.
 "While the miners are thus called upon to abandon part of their position, the mine owners undertake to pay temporarily in every district, except Northumberland, Cumberland and North Wales, the wages at the general rate prevailing before the strike began May 1. They also undertake to reinstate strikers as opportunity offers without prejudice to the men now working.
 A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Union, said: "Nothing was done to convince me that substantial progress was made. We propose to examine the memorandum very carefully. A settlement has not been reached."

FINDS TONE NOW IS MORE CHEERFUL


Major Ashton of Land Settlement Branch Speaks of New Brunswick

The pessimism which was evident amongst the farmers of the province about a year ago is gradually being dispelled, and there is a brighter outlook in the rural communities today than there has been for some time, according to Major E. H. Ashton, Maritime Superintendent of the Land Settlement Branch of the Department of the Interior. Major Ashton has spent the last 14 days in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, inspecting available farms for soldier settlers from the British Isles. He expressed himself as being quite satisfied with the success of this work for the present year.
 "I believe that New Brunswick is turning the corner on the way to prosperity, if it has not already turned it," he said.
 The establishment and operation of an abattoir here, he felt, was going to prove a big incentive towards the raising of more and better livestock, and he hoped that the canning factory, which was running here during the last summer and fall would remain with us and be kept in constant operation. He felt that there was a possibility for great development in the agriculture and stock raising fields in the Maritimes, and with the employment of modern methods of farming and the provision of adequate means of distribution and marketing, there would be a bright future in store for the agriculturists of New Brunswick.

C. P. MANAGER GOES TO HALIFAX BRANCH

J. B. Livesey Will Inspect Most Easterly Branch of Association

J. B. Livesey, general manager of the Canadian Press, who came from Toronto as a special guest at the Armistice dinner at the Admiral Beatty Hotel last evening, proceeded to Halifax on the noon train where he will inspect the most easterly branch of the news service under his direction. Mr. Livesey said his short stay in Saint John yesterday and the two commemorative functions he attended were highly enjoyed by him and will linger long in his memory as interesting occasions.
 From the standpoint of current news Mr. Livesey was asked by a Times-Star representative if he thought the Maritime Province were looming up more conspicuously than ever. The Canadian Press chief agreed that they were. He predicted furthermore that when the recommendations of the Duncan Commission report are made known and thoroughly digested by the people as a whole the three lower provinces will not only enjoy a closer and more enthusiastic relationship with the larger sections of the Dominion but will become a still greater factor in the Confederation. From his own standpoint of news-value the Maritime Provinces will naturally, therefore, be more interesting by long odds than the already interesting present.

 Roy Owens was arrested this morning on a warrant charging him with assaulting his wife. He will be brought before Magistrate Henderson this afternoon.


