REVIVAL DAY FOR R.K.Y.C. MEMBERS

Sailing, Power, Rowing, and
Canoe Races Are Well
Contested

A revival day for the members of the Royal Kennebec Yacht Club was held yesterday at the headquarters Millidgeville and proved one of the best in years. There was a large crowd of people present and the Saint John Power Boat Club joined in with the R. K. Y. C. in making the day one that will be long remembered. There was also present members from different clubs along the river, and the different races carried through were some and exciting. Commodore James Barnes received the guests and Vice-Commodore Gordon K. Holder was chairman of the day's program which proved a wonderful success. The program started at 4 o'clock with an exciting dinghy race. There were five entrants, viz: U. R. O. K., Mosquito, Suffragette, Renforth and Sea Gull. The course was six miles twice around. There was a strong breeze from the southwest and the boats made a wonderful showing, and the yachts were closely hunched throughout. The U. R. O. K., owned by Ralph Brennan, finished first, Mosquito, owned by Francis Lingley, was second, and Renforth, owned by Robert Melrose, third. This proved one of the best

revels for this class of boats ever seen on the Millidgeville course, but was not without accidents, as the Suffragette carried away her centreboard tackle and the U. R. O. K. a traveller block. A shield for the dinghy, donated by Holder for annual competition is to be raced for on every June 3, and the yacht capturing the first three wins holds the prize.

The next event was the whalebone race, five oars and a coxswain. This was won by the R. K. Y. C. crew with Howard Holder as coxswain, which defeated R. C. N. V. R. crew, who had one of the instructors as coxswain. It was an exciting race, and after the finish the R. C. N. V. R. rowers were entertained to luncheon by Mrs. R. J. White of Millidgeville.

The men's single canoe race was won by J. Pritchard, with Gordon Kelley second.

In the men's doubles, M. Scott and R. B. Brennan was first, with E. Murray and G. Holder second. There was some excitement in this contest when a canoe paddled by Pollard and McLean, upset, but there was no danger as the paddlers were good swimmers. The prize for the mixed doubles was won by Miss Currie and J. Pritchard, with Harry Giggsey and Jean Giggsey second.

The cabin power boat race was won by G. Kelley with the "Barbara" while Don Estabrooks with "Sky Pilot" finished second.

The ladies' rowing race was won by Grenville Ring with G. Holder second.

The ladies' race was captured by Elinor Holder with Jean Giggsey second. The prizes were awarded to the winners in the evening by Vice-Commodore Gordon Holder in the absence of

Commodore James Barnes, and then followed a delightful dance, and the party broke up shortly before midnight.

Tod Morgan Beats Kid Sullivan In Bout

NEW YORK, June 3.—Tod Morgan, of Seattle, successfully defended his junior lightweight championship here tonight, when he scored a technical knockout over Steve (Kid) Sullivan, of New York, a former titleholder, in the sixth round of a ten round match at the Brooklyn National Baseball Park.

Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., scored a technical knockout over Tommy Burns, of Detroit, in the second round of their ten round match at Ebbets Field tonight in the semi-final to a junior lightweight championship fight between Tod Morgan and Steve Sullivan.

The referee stopped the bout after one minute and fifty seconds of the second round. Burns was apparently hopelessly outclassed and was being hit almost at will by Delaney when the official stopped between them.

Arthur de Kuh, heavyweight, outpointed Cal Carter, in the first ten-

rounder. Carter was out in front during the early rounds but tired quickly. The victor weighed 210½; Carter, 196½.

Tommy Lorenzo, New York featherweight, won a judges' verdict over Billy Reynolds, of Jersey City, in a four-round opener.




