Hospital Aid Undertakes Care Of Some Special Cases

Organization Will Draw on Its Emergency Fund—Last Meeting of Season Held—Various Routine Matters Were Dealt With Yesterday

THE Women's Hospital Aid yesterday decided to undertake the care of special cases which were reported. The circumstances were exceptional and the meeting heartily approved of drawing on the emergency fund for this purpose.

Mrs. J. J. Stothart, president, was in the chair and the meeting, which was held in the Church of England Institute, was the last of the season. The Aid will convene again in September. Mrs. Walter L. Gregg, the secretary, read a letter received from R. H. Gale, superintendent of the General Public Hospital, who thanked the Aid for having granted to the hospital the use of the furniture formerly used by Miss Belle Howe, social service worker. Mrs. Gregg reported having written to Mrs. John Owens expressing the Aid's keen regret in the death of Mrs. Louis Owens, one of its most devoted and efficient workers.

Letters of sympathy were to be written to Mrs. T. H. Carter and Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson, members who have recently been bereaved.

VISITING REPORT

Mrs. E. A. Young gave the report of visiting at the General Public Hospital, specially referring to the abundant supply of magazines and the good attendance of the visitors. She had interested a certain organization in securing a special nurse for an accident case. Conveners were appointed for visiting in the summer months.

Mrs. Lester W. Mowry, treasurer, reported a balance of \$715.19 in the general fund, \$786.21 in the emergency fund and \$1,067.83 in the hospital ward special fund.

Mrs. J. H. Duddy reported that Mrs. W. E. Morris was now the Catholic convent in West Saint John and Mrs. S. C. Tippetts in Fairville.

Mrs. J. Carleton Lee reported as a special committee which interviewed Miss Margaret Murdoch to see what special comforts the Aid could provide patients in the General Public Hospital. It was suggested by Miss Murdoch that the Aid would give special care for three orphan children, who have been patients for a long time and need clothing. As an addition it was suggested the Aid might provide delicacies for the long term patients in a different ward each week.

The three children's immediate needs had already been provided for, it was said. The meeting agreed the Aid should undertake to provide delicacies for the long term patients.

Action was taken to ensure the emergency fund being drawn on for providing cabs for patients who require them and cannot obtain them otherwise.

Mrs. W. E. Morris gave the report of the visiting at the County Hospital, specially thanking Mrs. Bartley for providing a very welcome supply of funny papers and magazines that was always maintained. Miss Susie Isaac was thanked for gifts of magazines and papers. Conveners for visiting the County Hospital in the summer months were Mrs. W. E. Morris and Mrs. J. Goldman for the first month, the others to be appointed later.

The case of a County Hospital patient who, after three years in the hospital has been discharged but requires a year's rest and has no money, was spoken of. It was decided to undertake the responsibility for this case until the September meeting.

DENOMINATIONAL REPORTS

Denominational reports were received. For the Anglicans of St. Louis's 27 members' fees were received and a follow-up case; for the Roman Catholics

Mrs. J. H. Duddy reported 14 members' fees and follow-up care given three cases; for the Baptists, Mrs. N. C. Scott reported visitors had been supplied and 11 members' fees received. A case of an elderly lady, probably a permanent invalid, was brought to the attention of the Aid by Mrs. Scott, who was given authority to act in the matter. Mrs. J. Carleton Lee made an earnest plea for the owners of automobiles to take the patients for drives. She referred specially to the patients in the County Hospital. The suggestion was heartily endorsed.

A resolution of deep sympathy was passed with reference to the death of Dr. J. H. Allingham, whose loss was spoken of as a calamity.

The suggestion of bringing William Heughan to give a concert in aid of the society in September was spoken of and heartily approved.

SUNBURY BAPTISTS TAKE OBJECTION TO COUNTY INSPECTOR

District Meeting, Representing 1,300, Pass Resolutions at Mauderville

DENOMINATIONAL PAPER IS PRAISED

Urges New Pastoral Relations to Assist in Up-building Work

MAUDERVILLE, June 17.—At the fourth United Baptist district meeting, Sunbury county, held in Mauderville during last week-end a resolution expressing strenuous objection to the sub-inspector for the western end of Sunbury county, under the N. B. P. A., was adopted. Other resolutions dealt with denominational paper, church insurance and settlement of pastors. The meeting sat under the chairmanship of Rev. David Patterson, of Ruslingorish, with S. L. Alexander as clerk.

A resolution was adopted pledging support to the new editor of The Maritime Baptist and eulogising the former incumbent, Rev. Osgood Morse.

Other resolutions adopted were as follows: "The district meeting advises the churches to make a reappraisal of their church buildings on the basis of replacement values in order that an adequate amount of insurance may be carried."

"The district meeting requests the church clerks to put in the column 'salary paid to pastors,' the actual amount paid from June 1 to May 31 of the association year."

"In view of the fact that the chief inspector is given credit by many citizens as endeavoring to make the present prohibition law effective, the district meeting desires an efficient officer for Sunbury county. The district meeting, representing 1,300 Baptists, is determined to stand for the enforcement of the law and does strenuously object to the sub-inspector of the western end of Sunbury county."

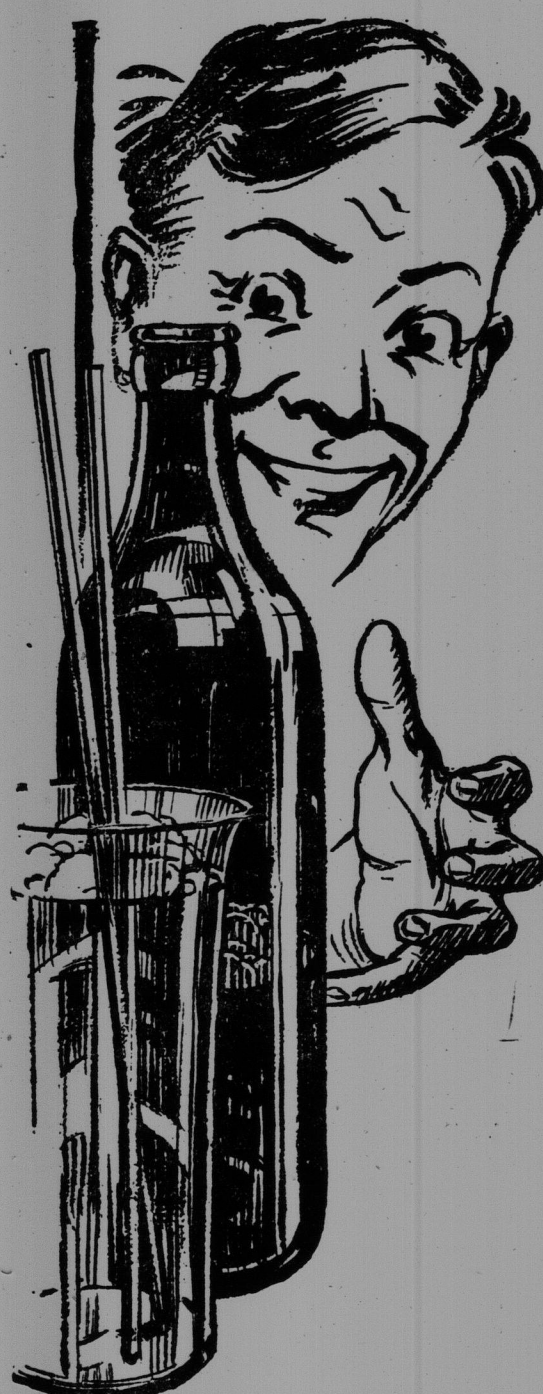
