BODY OF SCHOONER MAN COMES ASHORE

Inquest Into The Death of Alexander McLean is Declared Unlikely. The body of Alexander McLean, cook on the four-masted schooner Ellen Little, who had been missing from the vessel since the night of Wednesday, Sept. 8, was found on the beach at Little River yesterday afternoon by two boys, Gerald London, 28 1/2, Prince Edward street, and Joseph Brady, 127 Erin street.

J. W. VanWart this morning received word of the death of his sister, Mrs. J. W. Clark, widow of Rev. J. W. Clark, who was prominent in New Brunswick and in Saint John as a clergyman of the Baptist church. She died in Ottawa, March, 1885, was born on Christmas-Day, 1855, was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David VanWart, of Kears, Kings County, and would have been 70 years old this year. She was married with several children, and never married again. Mrs. Clark was here for some years, when her husband preached in Waterloo street and in Victoria street Baptist churches. He was afterwards at Woodstock and there he died. Mrs. Clark's body will be brought here for burial on Thursday, on arrival of the Montreal train. She will be buried beside her husband.

SLAYER OF TWO IS ENCIRCLED BY POSSE

Officers Believe Murderer of Sheriff and Police Chief is Insane. PHOENIX, Ill., Sept. 22.—Joseph Spennas, a coal miner, who shot and killed Sheriff Orville Lislefield, of Marshall County, and John Leonard, Tolson police chief, was surrounded in a farm-house near Tolson early today, by a posse, which asked that he be taken to the police station. Spennas previously had escaped from a house in Tolson in which he had barricaded himself, after the shooting threatened to kill the first one who attempted to take him. Officers believe he is deranged and doubt if he can be taken alive. Litchfield and Leonard were fatally wounded, when they went to Spennas' home after neighbors had complained of threats he made to kill any one who came near him.
