Veteran Saint John Printer Dies at Age of Eighty-One.

Noted in Younger Days as Probably Strongest Man in City.

Robert A. Johnston, prominently identified with the printing art in this city for nearly 70 years, passed to rest about noon today at his home, 2 St. Paul street. Considered in his prime to be the strongest man in the city, an accident a few years ago robbed him of much of his vitality, but this failed to keep him away from his loved work. In recent weeks he was employed with Charles M. Lingley, but sickness compelled him to stay home about a week ago. He was aged 81 years, and besides his wife, he leaves one son, Robert A., Jr., of the Boston Post, now in the city superintending funeral arrangements, and one daughter, (Nellie) Mrs. W. La Wyman of Edmonton, Alta

BORN IN ENGLAND.

Born in England in the year 1844, Mr. Johnston came to this country when a youth of nine years with his father, a tailor by trade, and had resided here ever since. Early in life, he was apprenticed to George A. Fenety, then owner of the Morning News and afterwards. King's Printer for New Brunswick. In time, he went into the printing business with John McKillop, but the great fire of 1877 destroyed their entire plant. Later, he became foreman on the Saint John Sun and it was a common thing for him to carry two of the extremely heavy forms across the street. He was known and respected by many of the men whose names are most prominent in the history of newspapers in this city, and his passing will be learned of with re-


