### SOTHERN FEARS FOR STAGE.

Says "People Outside" Can Prevent It "Going to the Dogs."

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 3.—"The stage is going to the dogs and going soon, unless the people outside the theatre save it," B. H. Sothern said in an address at the City Club's weekly luncheon. "It is the duty of the ordinary citizens, the theatre-goers, to elevate the stage," Mr. Sothern said. "A movement that is doing a lot to improve the stage is the tendency toward establishment of community theatres, often called the Little Theatres. The little theatre is a distinct asset to a community and to the stage in general. Through the little theatres talent is developed and trained for the professional stage. The community theatre should have not only financial support, but actual support of every citizen. Too many persons think they have done their duty when they buy tickets which they give away."
