GREEKS GET A NEW GOVERNMENT

Gounaris Remains But Will Not Be Delegate to Near East Conference.

Athens, Feb. 7.—G. Gounaris, whose break with former Premier Rallis led to the Greek ministerial crisis last week, remains as minister of war in the new Kallergopoulos cabinet, which took the oath of office yesterday, says an Athens despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

M. Gounaris will not go to London, it has been decided, in view of British opposition. Venizelos newspapers of this city severely criticize Mr. Gounaris for his role in the ministerial crisis. Georges Balassas, minister of agriculture, will act as premier while the conference is going on.

Constantinople, Feb. 7.—Indication that Mustafa Kemal Pasha and other Turkish Nationalists leaders had reconsidered their refusal to participate in the Near East conference in London was given in a despatch received here yesterday from Ankara. It was said the delegates would leave on Monday for London, traveling by way of Adalia and Brindisi.

RAID IN HULL; LIQUOR SEIZED

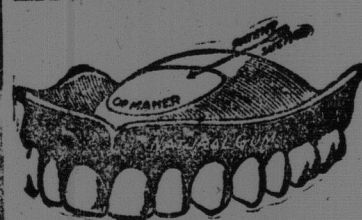
Ottawa, Feb. 7.—Headed by U. J. Jean, of the attorney-general's department, a large squad of operatives from the Quebec provincial revenue department, visited Hull on Saturday and conducted a big, systematic raid in search of liquor.

By five o'clock in the afternoon the court house resembled a government vendor's store, due to the large seizures. Several thousand dollars worth of liquor was taken.

WRANGLER WARNS OF PLANS OF REDS

Attack on Poland and Roumania—Asks Moral Support and Funds.

Constantinople, Feb. 7.—The Russian Bolsheviks are unable to maintain themselves without war, declared Gen. Wrangel anti-Bolshevik leader, today, so they are preparing an attack upon Poland through like a shot," he predicts. He says: "The biggest question in the world today is the Russian question, and civilization is being menaced by the new Bolshevik military propaganda."

"The only thing we ask from the outside world," he added, "is the moral support and the money which the nations, including the United States, should give in their own interest. I never received a cent from the French, the British or anybody, but conducted my campaigns by selling the grain of the country as we advanced. I lost the Crimea because I had no more munitions and clothing for my men."

London, Feb. 7.—The State of Azerbaijan has threatened to break off relations with Georgia unless the latter agrees to hand over all vessels flying the Russian flag and release immediately all communists held, and political persecution and grant the use of Georgia railways to neighboring states, according to a despatch from Ankara quoting advices from Moscow.

Tokio, Feb. 7.—What is regarded as a historic step toward the emancipation of Japanese women has been taken by the house of representatives in the discussion of a bill aiming at the nullification of the law prohibiting women from joining political associations or attending political meetings. The bill has the support of members of all the parties.

TORONTO WAGES SCALE

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Secretary Daggett of the building trades council on Saturday announced the 1921 wage scale of eighteen local unions affiliated with the council and the American Federation of Labor as decided upon as follows:—

Bricklayers, 81 an hour; structural iron workers, 85 cents; carpenters, 90; cement finishers, 75; electricians, 85 1/2; elevator constructors, 80; hoisting and portable engineers, 80 to 81; granite cutters, 81; lathers, 81; builders' laborers, 60; marble workers, 75; sheet metal workers, 80; painters, 75; plasterers, 81; plumbers, 90; steamfitters, 90; stone cutters, 81; stone masons, 81. All work eight hours a day five days a week and four hours on Saturdays.

DEATH OF E. C. BARNARD.

Washington, Feb. 7.—Edward Chester Barnard, commander of the U. S. section of the international boundary commission of United States and Canada, died yesterday, aged fifty-seven.

SAYS DESBOROUGH NEXT OCCUPANT OF RIDEAU HALL

London, Feb. 7.—(Canadian Ass'd Press).—The Daily Telegraph states that Lord Desborough will be offered and is expected to accept the governor-generalship of Canada in succession to Lord Dunsborough.

Lord Desborough is sixty-six years of age, and one of the most prominent of English sportsmen. He paid a visit to Canada last autumn and made many friends.

William Henry Grenfell, first Baron Desborough, was raised to the peerage in 1905. He has had a distinguished career, and at Oxford was famous as an athlete. He sat in the House of Commons for several terms. He served as private secretary to Sir William Harcourt at the exchequer. He was president of the London Chamber of Commerce and of the Imperial Council of Commerce. During the war he was president of the British Imperial Air Fleet and presented three airplanes to Canada. He was also on the treasury commission which started the war saving certificates.

NUMBER OF DEAD IS NOW PLACED AT FORTY

Santiago, Chile, Feb. 7.—The list of dead in the fighting between the soldiers and workmen of the San Gregorio nitrate plant on Thursday stood at about forty yesterday, according to press advices from Antofagasta. The immediate cause of the trouble apparently was the refusal of a demand by the workers for the keys to the commissary.

BLISS GARMAN GUEST.

Toronto, Feb. 7.—Bliss Garman, poet, who was born in New Brunswick but for twenty-five years, was given a dinner by the Arts and Letters Club here on Saturday night. He expressed his

gratitude to the club for sympathy shown him a year ago, when his health broke down. Brief addresses of welcome to the poet were given by Peter McArthur, Prof. Pelham Edgar, Dr. G. H. Locke and Augustus Bridle.

M. O. Hammond, financial editor of the Globe, vice-president of the Arts and Letters Club, presided.
