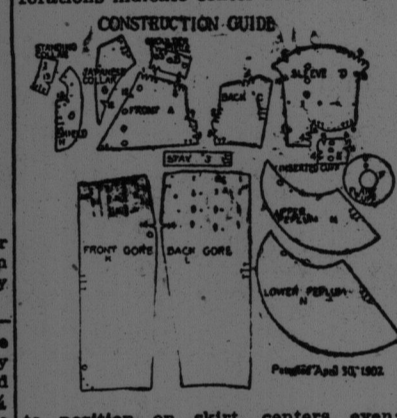

ATTRACTIVE MISSES' FROCK



Front and lower edges of back and long sleeves between double "V" perforations. Sew shoulder piece to front and back, and sew cuff to long sleeve as notched. Sew sleeve to armhole edge of front and back as notched. Close under-arm and sleeve seams as notched. Center-front indicated by large "O" perforations. Sew stay to lower edge of front and back, centers even, small "O" perforation at under-arm seam. If short sleeve is made sew flare cuff to lower edge, stretching cuff to fit sleeve. Sew Japanese collar to neck edge, and standing collar to shield as notched. Adjust shirt, make large "O" perforations in shield and in front even.

The skirt and pelium require careful handling. Slash lower part of front gore at center-front from lower edge to large "O" perforation. Pleat gores, creasing on lines of slit perforations, bring folded edges to corresponding lines of small "O" perforations; stitch or press to position. Join gores as notched, leaving left side seam free above large "O" perforation in front gore for placket. Arrange peliums together, short pelium on top, centers even and upper edges even; large "O" perforations indicate center-front. Adjust

PLANS TO DEVELOP SALT FISH TRADE TO NEWFOUNDLAND

Elder Dempster Magnate Intervenes London Management With Regard to Direct Service Between Ancient Colony and South America. (Montreal Gazette Cable.) London, July 28—David W. Campbell of the Elder-Dempster Line, who is staying at the Grand Hotel this week, yesterday gave the Montreal Gazette correspondent an interview. Mr. Campbell has been discussing with the London management of the line, the advisability of inaugurating a service between Newfoundland, Brazil and the Argentine, with the object of extending the salt fish trade from Newfoundland. This movement is considered especially timely now that the Norwegian government has subsidized a service in that trade between Norway and South American countries. Both Norway and Newfoundland are now doing a considerable trade in salt fish and this is considered capable of extension so it is proposed that the Elder-Dempster Line seek a government subsidy for the purpose of extending the Newfoundland trade. Mr. Campbell's health is now completely restored. He is going at the end of the week with Mr. and Mrs. David Brown to Edinburgh and Glasgow and hence to the lakes of Cumberland. The small black lace sunshades that our grand-mothers carried were seen and wondered at. They belong to a bygone age. But they will no doubt be the vogue at Deauville during the great fortnight. Roses are beautiful wherever they grow, but one scarcely expects to see them looking as if they had taken root at the bottom of a tulle dress. There was a band of brown tulle, no doubt in imitation of earth, and the stalks of the roses started from this band and the flowers hung in bunches like the Dorothy Perkins in our gardens. A dress of brown tulle was covered with these roses and made a charming picture, but one that we scarcely expected to see in the day time. We are prepared for roses at night, but are not yet accustomed to seeing them on a race-course. The large hat in tulle was almost hidden beneath green stalks and leaves, with one large bunch of roses on one side. Nothing more sensational could well be imagined, but it must be acknowledged that it was very attractive. Some unkind people tilted and said: "Ballet girl!" But these are the narrow-minded ones. There is a room for everything under the sun, even for tulle and roses in strange places. SHOT THREE WITHOUT ANY PROVOCATION

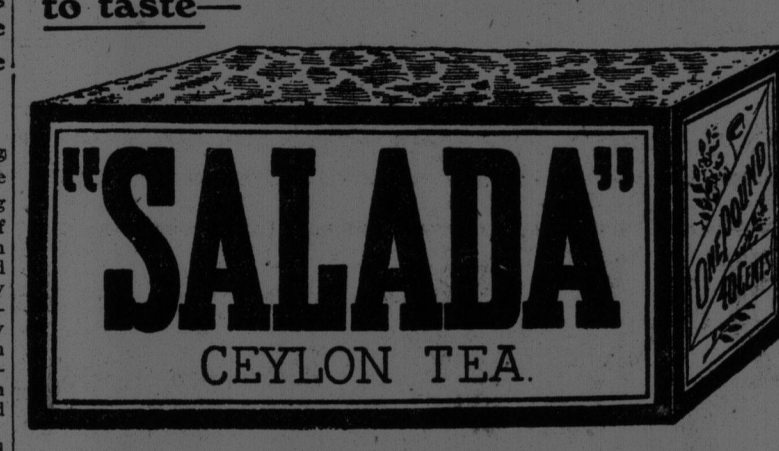
W. J. Campbell, Forman of Garig at Thorold, Ont., Opens Fire on His Men and Injures Three—Escapes Into Woods

Midland, Ont., July 27—A shooting affair occurred at Port Severn, twelve miles from here, yesterday morning about 3 o'clock. W. J. Campbell, of Thorold, foreman of a gang of men on the Trent canal, and a workman named Tyrell, went to Waubesahe, where they secured a supply of liquor. On their return they were met at the dock by friends. Campbell opened fire on them with a revolver, slightly injuring D. McLeod in the body, John Hunt in the arm and J. Tyrell in the leg. The injured men claim there was no provocation. After the shooting Campbell walked to the edge of the village where several tents are erected for foreign workmen and applied for a bed. He was refused and spent the remainder of the night in the bush. He returned about 9 o'clock to learn what he had done and then took to the woods. Search by the police has failed to locate him as yet.

TORONTO HOTBED OF REVOLUTIONISTS. Diaz and Huerta to Meet at Queen City and Engineer Counter Revolution For Purpose of Regaining Power in Mexico. Toronto, July 27—That a new Mexican revolution will shortly be started and that Toronto will be the centre of a conspiracy headed by Gen. Huerta, and Gen. Felix Diaz was stated today by Senor Luis Elguero, ex-member of the Huerta delegation which attended the mediation conference at Niagara Falls, who arrived in the city, with a view to making arrangements for the proposed counter-revolution, and that the president Huerta was expected, with his colleagues, in a few days. After spending a brief time in the city, Senor Elguero said that he would proceed to Montreal to meet Huerta. He and others, he said, had suffered heavily by the condition of anarchy prevailing in Mexico, and added: "The fact that we are supporting General Huerta in the revolution now being planned will be a potent factor."
