An informal smoker and social gathering of the men of St. Paul's church was held in St. Paul's school room last evening. There was a good attendance and a very entertaining programme was carried out. Cudde, church warden, announced that the finances of the church were in a satisfactory condition and expressed the hope that the young men of the church would take a greater interest in its welfare. He referred to the great loss suffered by the congregation in the death of T. Barclay Robinson who always took a very active part in the work of the church.

Songs were sung by T. Guy and Chester Gandy. A Twining Harp recited. Admirals All G. F. Palmer sang "Hearts of Oak and Drinking which were exceedingly well rendered. Fredrick Moore greatly pleased the audience by singing "Thora and two Irish songs by H. A. Allison were also well received. A song by Chester Bourne was heartily applauded. A. C. Shelton sang "Mandaly and Tale Belanika with fine effect, the audience joining heartily in the chorus of the latter which was followed by the National anthem. Percy Bourne proved a very efficient accompanist. Coffee and sandwiches were served at the close. The rector was very heartily congratulated on the success of the evening.
