Minister Found Guilty.

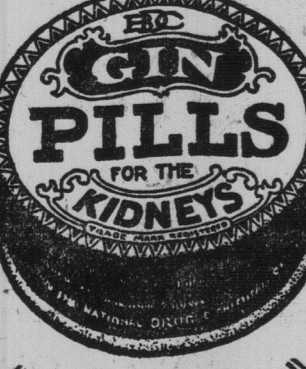

Turpentine reveals a somewhat weaker tone and declines ranging from 3c to 7c a gallon have been made. The situation in the primary market shows little action though hopes of improvement in regard to shipment of supplies to Great Britain are held out.

The institution of the Federal Trade Commission in the United States, manufacturers are practically unanimous in signing a stipulation in which they agree not to use the term "Manila" in the brand-name or label on any of the goods containing less than 100 per cent of pure Manila fibre, unless the matter contains qualifying words which conspicuously and clearly show the percentage of Manila hemp in the rope.

Similar action may follow in Canada. The order issued by the Dominion government prohibiting export of scrap iron will not affect scrap merchants from all accounts of scrap iron.

The only ones who suffer, it is said, paid far less than those of the States and the feeling exists that the steel men seem to have got behind the government and forced its hands so as to corner all the scrap iron for themselves at a cheap price.

The market holds firm, though Eastern reports indicate advances in many lines.

Advances have been made in cast iron, pipes, sheets, plate, boiler tubes showing no tendency to change.

Business is reported in fair volume and in many lines shipments are going forward as rapidly as railways will accept the freight.

PROMINENT BAPTISTS

We note with sympathy the passing of Mrs. Reed Slipp, of Central Hastings, N. B., the loved mother of Miss Augusta Slipp. By her work as provincial secretary of the U. B. W. M. U. Miss Slipp is widely known throughout the province, and will have the sympathy of all in her sorrow and loss.

We understand that the late Premier Brewster, of British Columbia, was a Baptist. And of those who were prominently mentioned as his probable successor at least two were Baptists—Hon. J. H. King, son of Senator King, of Chipman, N. B., and Hon. J. W. de la Parris, son of Hon. L. P. Parris, of White's Cove, N. B.

A news despatch from Ottawa announces the death of Mr. H. B. Harrington, son of the late C. H. Harrington, of Sydney, N. S. Only two weeks ago we published a notice of the death of his brother, Rev. F. G. Harrington. The member of the family best known to our readers is Rev. C. K. Harrington, of Tokio, Japan, now spending his furlough in Nova Scotia.

The work of the Moncton Suburban church is prospering greatly under the ministry of Rev. S. W. Stockhouse. Special meetings have been held for some weeks and great interest has been awakened. The Sunday school work has grown so that a larger building will soon be a necessity.

Bro. E. J. Kenyon closed a successful campaign with the Highfield street church, Moncton, on March 11. On the preceding Sunday Pastor Cookhouse baptised twenty and more will be baptised later.

The news has been received of the death of an Anglican minister, the Rev. Fred Smith, manager of the Western Union Telegraph Company, at Fredericton. The father is a prominent and active member of the Brunswick Baptist church.
