MUSICIAN SOUGHT AS MURDERER

Aged Victim Was Beaten to Death With a Crowbar In Chicago

LIKE MELODRAMA

Chicago, Dec. 12.—The authorities of Cincinnati, St. Louis, and Louisville were today asked to cooperate with the Chicago police in a search for Matthias Emil, a Mexican cornet player, who, the police think, may have knowledge of the murder of Nathan B. Hyde, seventy-six years old. The victim of the crime was beaten to death with a crow bar in his rooming house last night apparently while writing a letter at the dictation of the slayer. According to the police the motive was robbery.

Heretofore legal residence of Jews had been restricted to that section of the Polish province and the Ukraine determined by the original Jewish segregation law and known as "The Pale."

LIBERALS WILL ADD TO MAJORITY

Tories Like Man Who Lost and Wanted to Keep on "Double or Quits"

London, Dec. 13.—With considerable prospect of the government finishing the elections with a slightly increased majority, the only question left is low far the opposition to the House of Lords is likely to follow. The Conservative press is leaving matters where they were before, but the government's view on this point is summed up in the opinion of a prominent Liberal. "The elections," he said, "show a complete vote of confidence in our policy. It is unprecedented for a government to obtain a majority for a third time in succession. When the Conservatives were returned in 1900 with a heavy majority practically the same as that with which they returned in 1895. DYING MAN SAYS HE IS A VICTIM OF THE "BLACK HAND"

New York, Dec. 13.—When he was told that he was about to die, aged Salvatore Tollizzano, mortally wounded by three revolver bullets on Nov. 30 last, yesterday told Hoboken police he was shot for declining to pay tribute to the "Black Hand." Soon after making his statement the old man died, and in an hour a warrant charging murder had been issued for a man supposed to be the life-long friend, whom he accused. Tollizzano had amassed a cosy little fortune in running a milk route in Hoboken's little Italy. Late last month he was found in a hallway unconscious, and with three bullet wounds in the back. He was taken to a hospital and died yesterday.

JEALOUSY CAUSE OF TWO DEATHS

Canadian Woman is Murdered By Her Lover in Detroit

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 13.—(Special)—Tragedy resulted in murder and suicide here last night at 37 Park Place.
