

## Ex-Kaiser Demands Lot From Fatherland--Gets Most of It

BERLIN, Jan. 11.—A good deal has been written about the almost fabulous sums of money which the Prussian Republic has paid and is going to pay to Wilhelm of Doorn.

But there is another interesting side to the matter of settling up with the runaway, and that concerns the vast "payments in kind" which have been made to the royal exile.

At one time and another, it is now declared, various Prussian Governments have sent to the ex-Kaiser in Holland no fewer than 53 large pantheons full of furniture and art treasures taken from various palaces. It is obviously impossible to estimate the value of their contents, but it must be very considerable.

Included among the articles were 1,000 solid silver plates and 1,000 solid silver dishes of various kinds for the table.

In addition there were 360 table dishes made of solid silver and gold-plated.

Curious items appear on the long lists of "goods delivered." One shows that Wilhelm asked for — and, of course, received — as many as 230 thermometers!

Another article he insisted on having was a tall iron flagstaff from one of the Berlin palaces.

His ex-Majesty also had sent to him from Potsdam a number of weather-cocks and an electric wind gauge, by means of which he can see, without leaving the house, which way the wind is blowing.

## To Move Leicester Lounge Piecemeal To New Location

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The Leicester Lounge, known to Britishers all over the world as a popular rendezvous in Leicester Square, will be incorporated in the very near future in a well known military business.

Important plans are almost completed, and soon the corner which is now famous for this resort of the old West End type will become one of the finest military corners in Europe.

A well known firm of costumers and milliners occupy extensive premises adjoining the Leicester Lounge, and it is their intention to reconstruct the Lounge as an extension to their present establishment.

The firm purchased the Leicester Lounge some years ago, and no elaborate corner building.

It is anticipated that the cost of the scheme will be at least a million dollars. It is intended to take the famous "Lounge" down piecemeal, and transport it to another site—which has still to be chosen—and there the Leicester Lounge will be rebuilt exactly as it is now.

## Tutor Fails In Peagee Claim

LONDON, Jan. 11.—Evidence of ordinary physical resemblance is not admitted by law of Scotland, it is too loose and fanciful.

This declaration was made by Lord Anderson, when judgment was given by the Second Division of the Court of Sessions, Edinburgh, in an appeal by Alexander Grant, retired tutor of Cromwell road, London, against the Countess of Seafield and others, to have it declared he is the eldest lawful and legitimate son of Viscount Selkirk, afterwards seventh Earl of Seafield, and his spouse, Caroline Stuart, sister of Lord Bantyre.

## Referee Is Stunned As Football Hits Him

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The referee in a West Cheshire football league match at Ellamere Park recently was struck on the back of the head by the ball when one of the backs made a clearance, and he fell unconscious.

He was carried into the dressing-room, where a doctor found that he was suffering from concussion. The referee remained unconscious until the game ended, and though later he recovered partly, he was unable to give particulars of himself.

## GREAT INTEREST IN OTTAWA TEAM

### Senators Make Initial Bow in New York Tonight Against Americans

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—With the probable exception of the formal introduction of professional hockey to New York sport fans, the game tonight between the Ottawa Senators, leaders of the National Hockey League, and the New York Americans, has created more local interest in hockey circles than any other contest.


