THE TREASURY.

By the Treasurer's Reports it will appear that the balance from last year was \$35 09½, and that the sum of \$251 89½ has been collected during the past year. The expenditure has been \$189 07,

Her mother's meetings have been well attended, and a good deal of interest has been shown in them. As a proof of this it may be mentioned that when intending to discontinue one of them for the winter, she was met by so many expressions of disappointment that she was encour-

"In selling Bibles, Mrs. Jack has been successful; and it may be hoped that these will eventually prove real seeds of life in the families into which, by God's providence, His word has been introduced. It was thought necessary to employ a second Bible Woman for a few months to assist Mrs. Jack. Mrs. Bollard was employed from July to the end of the year, and was most useful in visiting in Stuartsville, and in selling Bibles in that district.

"The funds of the Association would not allow of supporting more than one Bible Woman, with a Colporteur, or your Committee would have been glad to continue her services."

THE TREASURY.

By the Treasurer's Reports it will appear that the balance from last year was \$35 09½, and that the sum of \$251 89½ has been collected during the past year. The expenditure has been \$189 07, leaving in the Treasurer's hands a balance of \$97 92.

REMARKS.

The Collectors have continued to visit in their districts, supplying the poor with Bibles and taking up subscriptions from both the rich and the poor, for sending out a Colporteur to the surrounding country.

During six months of this year Mr. Downie has been employed as Colporteur jointly with the Tract Society. We regret to state that he has been obliged to resign for the winter, but we hope that an Agent will soon be found to fill his place.

Mr. Downie's statement will show what has been his work during

that period. He writes:

"During the six months I travelled 1207 miles, visited 1688 families, sold 136 Bibles and 259 Testaments, and gave away 8 Bibles and 11 Testaments. The sales were comparatively few, considering the labor, for money is more scarce with farmers in summer than in winter.

"I conversed with more than 500 families on vital godliness, not without effect, I trust, in some instances. Some had no regard for the truth, yet others showed heartfelt love for it, and gratitude to the Association for sending them the Bible. People have hastened after me on the road when they knew I had Bibles to sell, in order to purchase from me; and when I was travelling on foot, near the Railroad, some men who were working stopped me to buy Bibles.

"Many old people bought large type Bibles; and children have brought their purses and emptied their little savings into my hand to buy Bibles for themselves. Indeed, in some cases, I have witnessed great love in both old and young for God's sacred word."

Besides several grants to individuals, your Association have purchased a Loan Stock, which will supply the aged and poor with the Scriptures. They have also granted 12 Bibles to the Orphans' Home, 6 Bibles and 6 Testaments to the House of Industry, and 12 Bibles and 12 Testaments to the Midland District School.

A short account of the Bible Women is here given from the Lady Superintendent's Report:

"Though not able this year to carry on her systematic visiting so continuously, Mrs. Jack has been faithful and diligent in her visits to the homes of the poor women; towards whose moral and spiritual improvement her efforts have been more especially directed .-Her kind, gentle manners, and the interest and sympathy with Abstract of issues of the Scripture by the Kingston Ladies' Bible Association, from the 31st December, 1865, to the 31st December, 1866.
