## TWO MEN IN NIGHTSHIRTS RESCUED UNKNOWN SAILOR

Capt. Powell and Engineer of Drowning Man Out of Union Street Slip Last

A Nova Scotian sailor had a narrow escape from being drowned last night and only the prompt action of Captain Bayard Powell and the engineer of the steamer Westport saved the man's life.
