BILL TO ANNUL POND'S CHARTER WITHDRAWN

Reach an Agreement

The Matter Settled in Augusta Yesterday -Driving and Improvement Co. Incorporated and Will Make Many

Changes

A few weeks ago the Star announced on the authority of Levi W. Pond, that the lumber war on the St. John River had practically been settled. At that time there were before the Maine Legislature bills to annul the Pond Sheer Boom Co. and Madawaska Log Driving Co.'s charters. If these went through, Admiral Pond's career on the river might be regarded as at an end, but the veteran announced his intention of finding a way out of the difficulty. In defiance of Mr. Pond's proclamation, Senator Theriault of Aroostook strenuously denied the reported end of the conflict and maintained that the contest would be carried to a finish. He was determined then to push the bills annulling the two charters.

Mr. Pond went to Augusta, as he had stated was his intention, and whether or not his visit had anything to do with the outcome, the result is his success. Yesterday the opposing parties reached an agreement and as a result the bills directed against the driving companies' charters have been withdrawn. A new draft bill has been prepared for the incorporation of "The Upper St. John River Driving and Improvement Company," which will likely pass without any serious opposition. This company will be given power to make important improvements in the conditions of the river, by diverting certain waters, constructing, holding and driving booms, erecting dams, and in various other ways endeavoring to make the business of log driving less risky. This bill was favorably reported on by the judiciary committee, which report was accepted by the legislature.


