1st. Insanuch as the United States of North America, by the Annexation of Texas to their territory, have openly violated their friendship with this nation; it is hereby declared, that from the passage of this law, the treaties of friendship, connectee and navigation concluded between the said people in 1803, and mutually accepted and ratified in January of 1802, are at an end.

2d. In consequence whereaf, from the publication of this law, the terms of six months and of moyear, for various purposes agreed upon it said treaties, shall begin to be completed.

3d. The Government orders the closing of all ports to the commerce of the United States, and forbids the use of their manufactures.

4th. No proposition relative to the restoration of friendship will be listened to from the Chamber of the American minister at Mexico was informed that the diplomatic relations between the two countries had created.
