Mr. J. W. Carmichael, of New Glasgow, was in town Saturday.

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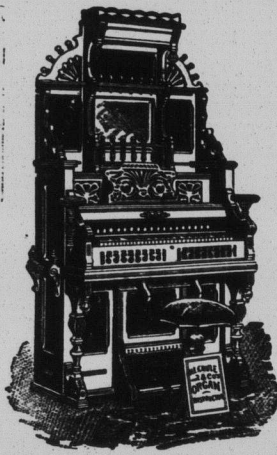
