

TO TRY TO REACH NORTH POLE.

TO TRY TO REACH NORTH POLE. Berlin, July3. — According to the Lokalanzeiger, Count Zeppelin intends to make an effort to reach the North Pole in his airship. The Emperor ac-cepted protectorship over the under-taking, after listening to a report on the subject by Professor H. Herge-sell, of the University of Strassburg. The plan embraces a thorough ax-ploration of the polar regions by means of a Zeppelin airship, before undertaking to reach the Pole. A craft of special strength will be built for the expedition, and the outfit will be equipped under the direction of Count Zeppelin. ANOTHER COAL CRISIS. London, July 2.—The country is threatened with another serious coal orisis.
