## Liberals Misjudged Canadian Sentiment

Reciprocity Agreement Arranged Through Lack of Appreciation of Loyalty of Canadian People — Statements of Hearst Organs Have Aroused Storm of Protest.

Montreal, Sept. 19.—The Star gives prominence today to the following editorial on the subject: "Our Policies and Our Prospects."  
As this is the most momentous campaign in the history of the Canadian people draws to a close it is impossible for those of us who have fought in this first move in the aggressive imperialism of our ambitious American neighbors, from the day that Fielding laid it on the table of parliament, to keep our spirits from rising as we contemplate the prospect. Never before has the nation taken so keen an interest in any political issue. Never before has nomination day passed with but one solitary election by acclamation—and that the election of a man who left his party to oppose its treacherous and insidious proposition. Canadians Misjudged.

Those who told us last January that the Canadian people could no longer be rallied by appeal to their loyalty, and that the spirit of our country had been made it has visibly touched the hearts of the younger generation of voters, as well as those who may this week cast their last ballots.

It is true that some of our mechanical politicians failed to appreciate at first the magnitude of this question. They talked "markets" when they should have talked national destiny. They naturally tended to confuse our people. They did not know whether they were voting on the price of eggs or the price of Canadian nationality.

But the sure instinct of an alert nation, confronted with imminent peril, has found the truth. These last weeks of the fight have been waged with the defenders of the Dominion fully conscious of the high mission on which they have gone forth; and that the Canadian must live in the enchanted castle of silence, who does not know today that the future of his country is at stake.

Our Battle Song.

The flag has been flung to the breeze, those who were fearful at first when they heard its folds flapping in the wind, now rejoice to fight under its inspiration; and we are at last in a position in which the National Anthem itself has become a battle song of our army of national preservation.

The effect of such a campaign could hardly be in doubt. The people of Canada are essentially loyal. They are as eager to make money as any body else; and they are as good at it as any rivals, not excluding the super-shrewd Americans. But they value some things above money. They have sentiments, yes, sentiments such as cynics sneer at them, which are not for sale. There are some rights and privileges and glories that they are not prepared to buy with money. If it is necessary to make financial sacrifices to keep the name of Canada on the map, our people will make them. When vital questions of this character are to the fore, it is idle to tell us that we can get a penny here and a penny there by endangering our national existence.

What We Will Not Sell.

How could we ever put a price upon our national heritage? We should have to begin by estimating how much money life-long martyrdom of United Empire Loyalists was worth. Then we should be compelled to assess the value of French fealty which stood by the British flag because the British flag had protected their privileges and accorded them justice.

Next we would have to reckon in dollars and cents the worth of the lives sacrificed in driving back the American invaders of two wars. To this we must add the cash value of the devotion of the men who stayed with Canada when their companions sought the lure of American prosperity, the pluck of the pioneers, the national

**TRAIN DERAILED ON THE SHORE LINE**

A freight extra on the New Brunswick Southern Railway was partially derailed last evening at nine o'clock near Lepreau. The engineer, Edward Cain had two fingers crushed, while the fireman, H. W. Long received a severe scald, but fortunately no one else was injured.

The train which consisted of five cars was running at low speed, when one truck left the rails. In the consequent elevation of the engine, the injury to the two men occurred. The remainder of the train did not leave the track, and no damage resulted either to engine or cars. Word of the mishap was at once sent to the C. P. R. offices, and an auxiliary crew was dispatched from the Bay Shore. In a few hours time the train was once more in running order, and the line cleared.

The cause of the accident has not as yet been ascertained. The circumstance of the train running at low speed at the time of leaving the rails is responsible for the small amount of damage done, and it is probable that had the rate been higher, a serious accident would have occurred.

**BRILLIANT ADDRESS BY A FAMOUS SPEAKER**

William Jennings Bryan delivered last evening one of the ablest addresses to which it was ever the pleasure of a St. John audience to listen. With the power, eloquence and keen insight of the orator and statesman, Mr. Bryan, the Christian ex-leader of the Democratic party, and ex-presidential candidate, carried his hearers with him as with rapt attention they listened to his presentation of the beautiful story of Christ, "The Prince of Peace."

"I am glad," said Mr. Bryan, "to speak under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., an organization which supplements the work of the church, the school and the gymnasium."

He dealt briefly with the subject of evolution, summing up his idea of this theory in the words, "I would rather have a high ideal resulting from my creation after the image of God, than a low ideal arising from the brute."

He spoke of the government of the "Prince of Peace," which is founded on justice, and the increase of which cannot be measured.

Christ is called the "Prince of Peace," because He gave a definition of greatness. He is greatest who does the most amount of good. Christ has given the one and only method by which the Truth can be propagated. Many methods have been adopted in days gone by. Man cannot be taught to believe by coercion these things which do not appeal to his conception of what is right. Christ's method stands pre-eminently, "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."

Finally Christ is called the "Prince of Peace," because He has endowed us with a platform which proves a solution for every dissension of man and, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."
