NOTES AND NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

The men whose hair turned white in a single night is surpassed by the Boston girl who lost her completely in one dance.

Those workmen who clamored for "bread and blood" in New York, Tuesday last, were favored with the latter. And yet, just as likely as not, they were not satisfied.

Samuel A. Adams was divorced, at the recent session of a Vermont county court, on account of the "intolerable severity" of Sarah, his wife. It was in evidence that she was accustomed to kick him out of doors, and subject him to other petty annoyances.

A New Hampshire lecture committee wrote to Boston to learn what Mrs. Scott-Siddons would read for. The reply was "8000 and expenses; answer, as Mrs. Siddons will sail for Europe at once if you don't want her." "Let her sail," was the answer.

Ex-Mayor Hall of New York has five daughters and one son. The latter banes himself with a printing press, preparatory to learning the art of printing, practically, and then journalism; one of the daughters is a designer and etcher; the second a writer of children's books and a pianist; the third, a student of Lyric art; the fourth, an accomplished amateur actress; and the fifth is learning to be a modiste and milliner.

The Howard Association of Memphis is reported to have a net surplus of \$25,000 on hand, after doing its good work during the pestilence of last summer. Thus virtue is its own reward; but the oddity of the affair is, that during her trouble, Memphis issued scrip which was afterwards redeemed with the money charitably contributed by her sister cities, and now it looks as if she had made money by her misfortunes, and had appealed for funds after ceasing to need help.

The wife of one of the masked bandits in New York called at the prison to see her husband the other day. She kissed him through the bars, and after wiping a tear from her eye she handed him a box of cigars, a large paper of chewing tobacco and some clothing. She wore four sparkling diamond rings, a pair of large diamond earrings, and an elegant solid gold square-banded pin, which nestled in a white lace collar. She wore a black silk dress trimmed with real lace, over which was a true blue velvet cloak, also trimmed with real lace. She was accompanied by a young girl, a waiting maid, whom she called Mary Ann. She carried a Russian leather reticule and a carrier's hair shawl belonging to her mistress.

The story of the recent suicide of Pedro Armljo, the Sheep King of New Mexico, has a touching bit of romance about it. He was only about 23 years of age, and was descended from one of the first Spanish families in New Mexico. His people are immensely rich, and while yet a boy young Armljo displayed business talents of a most pronounced character. He started out in a New York banking house, but subsequently returned to New Mexico and engaged in sheep culture and herding, an occupation which had been followed by his family for generations. At one time he had herded three miles from Denver 10,000 sheep, and it was estimated that he controlled over 200,000 head of sheep in his own territory and the vicinity of his home. During his sojourn in Denver, Armljo was betrothed to Miss Otero, whom he idolized with all the fervor of his nature, and he repeatedly spoke of the engagement and happiness he anticipated when the betrothal should be consummated. One evening in November, Armljo went to Foster's medium, to participate in a seance. During the sitting Foster told Armljo that he would come to a violent death, and that he would either be murdered or take his own life. The latter proved true. Having been fitted by Miss Otero, the Sheep King took advantage of his first opportunity to commit suicide, blowing out his brains with a pistol ball, last week.

FASHION.

A modification of the Elizabethan ruff is a founding collar of black lace made over foundation muslin, the lace being studded with gilt beads in elaborate profusion.

The newest French bonnets are trimmed almost exclusively with feathers of three or four different shades. All knick-knacks, gilt or steel stars, daggers, etc., are ignored.

Cut glass chandeliers in the pyramid form are all the rage in the drawing-rooms of the New York fashionables. No globes are used, but instead white china tinted sticks in excellent imitation of the genuine wax light so universally used abroad.
