The celebration in connection with the Silver Jubilee of the Catholic Order of Foresters, held in Toronto last week is on account of press of matter held over until next week's issue.

ORDERS WERE CONFERRED.

Amongst the last official works of His Grace Archbishop O'Connor was the conferring of Orders upon two of the young ecclesiastics of St. Michael's College. The ceremony of conferring minor Orders took place on Friday morning, Mr. Victor G. McFadden of Peterborough, being the recipient. On Saturday morning His Grace, assisted by Very Rev. Father Roche, Superior of the College, and Rev. Father Du Mouchel, C.S.B., raised to sub-deaconship Mr. Victor G. McFadden and Mr. John V. Ziegler of Detroit, Michigan. Mr. Ziegler is for the Michigan diocese and will be raised to the priesthood before the end of the month. Mr. McFadden is intended for the diocese of Peterborough, and will in all probability be ordained in the Cathedral of his native town some time before the close of the year.

CONFIRMATION AT ST. PATRICK'S.

On Sunday afternoon Archbishop O'Connor administered the Sacrament of Confirmation at St. Patrick's. The occasion was remarkable as being the last occasion upon which the Archbishop would publicly officiate, and also for presenting the largest class ever confirmed by the retiring Archbishop. The class contained 213, of whom 35 were adults. His Grace was assisted by Rev. Father Murray and Rev. Father Brick, rector of St. Patrick's.

The children presented a most pleasing picture and the church was packed throughout the ceremony. The Archbishop gave the children his customary admonition to join no society without first consulting their parish priest. He also administered the Temperance pledge to the boys of the class. Though no reference was made by the Archbishop to his coming retirement from office, a certain note of sadness forced itself upon many of the large congregation present. Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament closed the ceremonies.

ARRIVAL OF HIS GRACE.

The C.P.R. train bearing Archbishop McEvay was scheduled to arrive at the Union Station at 6.35 on Tuesday evening and some minutes before the appointed time the committees of priests and laity assembled to await his coming, and be the first to profess the allegiance of Toronto to its new spiritual head. As the train came to a standstill Archbishop McEvay, accompanied by Very Rev. Vi-

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car-General McCann, stepped to the platform. The members of the reception committee at once surrounded the Archbishop, and nearly all had opportunity to kiss the ring and shake the hand of bishop and friend before proceeding to the waiting-room to await the coming of the Apostolic Delegate, who was to arrive from the east at 7 o'clock.

Father John Coffey, S.J., accompanied His Grace from Guelph; where he has been for a week past. Vicar-General McCann joined the train at West Toronto. Fathers T. Sullivan, Thorold, Whelan, St. Michael's, and O'Donnell, St. Mary's, also accompanied him. His Grace, Archbishop McEvay, looked well and hearty, and as he chatted in the interval of waiting, his face beamed with pleasure, and it was evident to all that if the burden which he had assumed is a heavy one, the shoulders which bear it are buoyed up by the bright spirit within, and that it will be in an optimistic spirit with hope at the helm that he will pursue his work in his new charge.

At the time due the train bearing the Apostolic Delegate, the Most Rev. Donatus Sbarretti, arrived. Members of the deputation again welcomed the honored guest and His Excellency was escorted to where the Archbishop awaited him. Amongst those who came on the same train was His Lordship Bishop O'Connor of Peterborough, who also received a loyal welcome from many old friends.

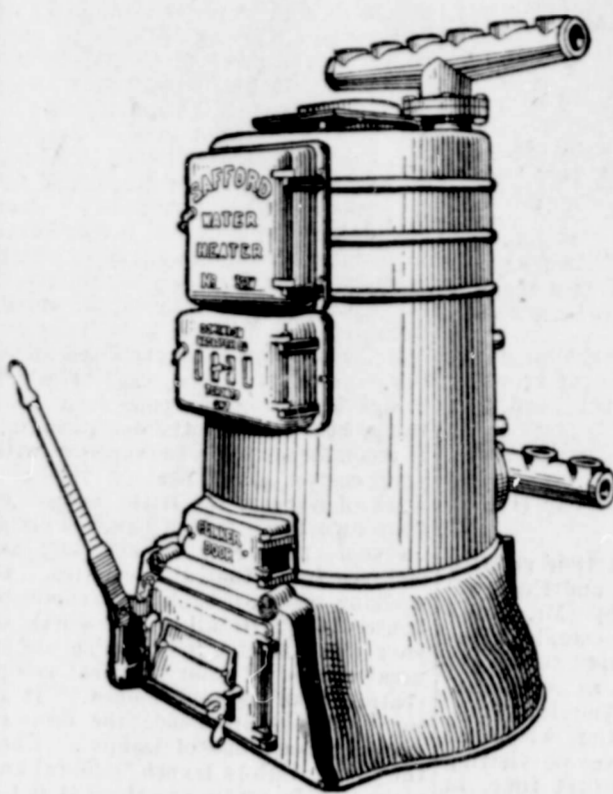
